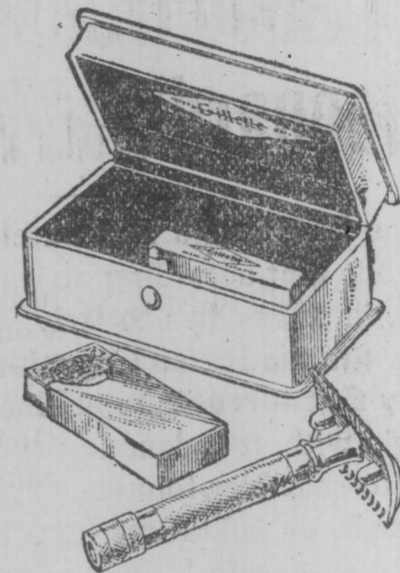

RUMANIA GIVES ORDER TO CANADA

Nine Million Dollars' Worth of Woolen Textiles to be Manufactured.

An order for nine million dollars' worth of Canadian woolen textiles has been placed with the manufacturers of the Dominion by the Rumanian Government, according to information received. The order was not given through the usual channel of the official purchasing commission, but was arranged for by London agents and payment is guaranteed by a London bank, it is stated.

About 1,900,000 yards of cloth and knit goods to the value of \$2,000,000 are included in the Rumanian order and this material will, in the main, be used for railroad workers and other Government employees.

Arrangements were made for the purchase some time ago and the order was placed with the Canadian Wool Manufacturers' Association, which has its headquarters in Hamilton. It was then split up by this association and divided equally among the various woolen and knitting mills connected with it, of which there are over a hundred scattered all over the Dominion. Several Montreal firms are said to have received large portions of the order but were unwilling to give out any information on the subject.

The congestion in European factories led to the placing of orders here, it is said, in spite of high exchange.

Japan's complaint about the alleged unfairness of this country's recent shipping legislation is doubtless the first of several which will be forthcoming in the near future. Unquestionably the Jones Merchant Marine Act discriminates against the shipping of other nations. Before it can be put fully into effect various treaties—more than twenty in all—whereby the United States agreed to forego discrimination against the shipping of nations which reciprocate in the matter will have to be denounced. Naturally these nations do not like the new law, and they may find some basis upon which they can protest. One section of the act includes the Philippine Islands under the coastwise shipping provisions, and the Philippines are objecting to that. Norway, it seems, will be especially injured by the new law, and it may be expected to protest. And other nations.

Total Crop Near Billion Bushels

OTTAWA, Sept. 15.—That the Canadian wheat crop this year will be 839,000,000 bushels as against 193,000,000 last year is the latest official estimate of the Bureau of Census and Statistics.

The oat crop is placed at 556,000,000 bushels, compared with 394,000,000, while barley will be 64,000,000, compared with 56,000,000 last year and flax 11,000,000.

In the Prairie Provinces alone the wheat estimate is 260,000,000, oats 359,000,000, barley 43,762,000 and flax 10,817,000. In Manitoba the wheat yield is estimated at 40,505,000 bushels, Saskatchewan 136,880,000, Alberta 82,972. This is about 600,000 bushels less than the Manitoba yield last year, but is an increase of 47,000,000 in Saskatchewan and 48,000,000 in Alberta. The oat yield of Saskatchewan is placed at 173,000 bushels, Manitoba 61,328 and Alberta 124,553.

Forgotten or Never Remembered

What does the name of A. C. Reid mean to you? We thought so. And that of St. Clair Street means even less. All that Reid did was to fly across the Atlantic Ocean—first man to traverse that waste of water in a flying machine. Reid and his fellows did the great feat for the honor of the United States Navy, and their own names are already forgotten. St. Clair Street and his fellows—all men of the Regular Army—having done their work, having flown from New York to Alaska in fifty-five hours actual time in the air, got the honor of a small paragraph in the newspapers announcing their arrival in Nome and naming only the leader of the expedition. It is printed on an obscure page, where not one reader in a dozen ever finds it, much less thrills at the sheer wonder of the achievement. Meanwhile a professional athlete, about whom still clings the reputation of having been a slacker in the war, gets a column and a half because his manager says that sometime next winter he may have a fight with a foreign champion.
