### East Florenceville Has Big and Successful Entertainment

The Florenceville folks turned  
out on Tuesday evening in num-  
bers which taxed the local Hall to  
its capacity to witness the  
staging of an entertainment

titled "Out in the Streets" and

Solomon Arnold, a pious, Shylock  
and his dissolute son Matthew.  
Also the destitute Mrs. Bradford  
and their six-year-old Mimie.  
There was a skeleton in the  
closet of the Wayne family be-  
fore the Colonel's marriage. His  
only sister had been cast out and  
reputed by her family because  
of her infatuation with a worth-  
less Orlan Bradford and a news-  
paper paragraph had left the Col-  
onel for many years in the belief  
that she was dead. She is alive  
however and her dissipated hus-  
band having died she returns  
penniless to the city of her birth.  
Too proud to approach her brother  
she seeks toil to provide for her-

mutual recognition on the part of  
brother and long-lost sister. He  
takes her to his palatial home  
and then sets out to deal with  
the heartless landlord upon whom  
it develops the Col. has a strange  
hold, for at one time in his history  
Arnold had forged the Colonel's  
name for a considerable amount  
but had been let off through the  
force of his snivelling pleading.  
He is now confronted with his  
dastardly act of casting out the  
poor woman and her child and is  
delivered up to the law to pay the  
full penalty for his crime of for-  
gery. The closing act shows  
promise of new happiness in the  
Wayne household for not only  
are the restored sister and her  
child lavishly provided for, but  
marriage bells ring out. Nina  
Wayne is given to the lover of her  
choice, the young Dr. Medfield.

The play yields some excellent  
situations. The were done ad-  
mirably considering the inexperience  
of the actors. The heavy  
parts were doubtless those of  
Col. Wayne and Mrs. Bradford.  
Roy Hunter and Mary Fitzpat-  
rick, in these parts made a  
strong centre of the body of the  
play. J. F. Waugh and George  
Melville put character into the  
villain parts as the Arnolds, fa-  
ther and son. Carrie Carle was  
a good Nina Wayne. Jean Kil-  
patrick as the Colonel's better-  
half was dignified and duly self-  
assertive. In a climax scene P.  
R. Semple as policeman executed  
the demands of the law. B. A.  
Campbell filled the role of Dr.  
Medfield. Bessie Hunter was a  
good selection for the part of  
little Mimie Bradford.

A popular vote would doubtless  
have made P. R. Semple the  
star of the evening. He was  
voted. His was the popular part.  
As Pete the colored servant of  
Col. Wayne from "Nori Canby"  
with his rolling eyes and native  
stupidity he was everywhere ef-  
fective.

The program as arranged pro-  
vided some good side numbers all  
of which were well received. A

good enough for a while and were  
making a living out of it. A musical  
dialogue entitled "We'll live to  
mortgage the farm" was presented  
by six children. A lanky local

for an encore. A tableau, "En-

sented by Mary Fitzpatrick,  
Stella Hunter, Carrie Carle, Pearl  
Carle, Annie Rideout, Phoebe  
McLean and Jean Kilpatrick. A  
duet was rendered by Mrs. P. R.  
Semple and Mrs. Roland Semple.  
Stella Hunter and Crystal  
Davis were heard in several in-  
strumental duets during the even-  
ing. Amy Tompkins was wel-  
comed with her violin and War-  
ren White rendered a pleasing  
solo. Mrs. G. A. Ross gave a  
reading entitled "The Death  
Bridge of Tay".

The newly-formed Comedy  
Company asked popular theatre  
prices for their show and it is  
safe to say that the large gather-  
ing of patrons had two hours and  
a half of good entertainment.  
Several of the participants in the  
vocal and instrumental part of  
the program were old favorites


