PERSONAL.—Judge King spent last Sunday at Sackville as the guest of Rev. R. Brecken. Mr. A. E. Cogswell, lately teller of the Halifax Banking Co. here, has been removed to the St. John office of the Company. Mrs. Willard Flint, nee Miss Francis Caroline Chapman, daughter of Thos. C. Chapman, Esq., of Sackville, was presented last week to the wife of the President of the United States. Senator Hay has been visited by his wife and daughter and wife came over from the Island yesterday.

SHOP BREAKING.—The store of George E. Ford was broken and entered Monday night and robbed of a quantity of goods. Among the articles missed were a watch valued at \$50, a seal skin cap, price \$15, a watch chain, several pairs of gloves, two pairs skates, silk handkerchiefs, shirts and drawers, a lot of nuts, candles, tobacco, etc., and about one dollar in cash. Suspicion was directed to two boys named Robert Gillis and Edward Chambers, and it was learned at the station that the latter, who belongs to Moncton, had taken the train for home Tuesday morning. The station agent at Memramook was notified, and on arrival of the train the boy was arrested and sent back to Sackville. The watch, fur cap and some of the other stolen articles were found in his possession. Gillis was arrested at home and some of the missing articles were found on the premises. The prisoners were examined Tuesday afternoon before Commissioner Cahill, and Chambers admitted his guilt, but Gillis refused to make any statement. Both were committed to jail to await trial at the March sitting of the County Court.

Amherst.

—Dr. Dobson will remove his office to Black's Block next week and will be heard at the Amherst Hotel.

—J. Albert Black, proprietor of the Gazette, has been confined to his house several weeks by illness, and is still unable to go out.

—Delahunt & Savage have sold five sleighs and eighteen punge this season and are getting up about twenty buggies for the spring trade. They report business good.

—Holmes' carriage factory is having a prosperous season. About twenty sleighs and punge have been sold and attention is now being turned to carriages for the coming season.

—Amherst Council, Royal Arcanum, numbers seventy-five members, and is in a flourishing condition. Five deaths have occurred in the membership since the council was organized, and the council has thus been the most successful distributing \$15,000 in insurance.

—Two young women who had infested the ladies waiting room at the station of late, and had become an embarras nuisance, were arrested by Detective Skeffington, of the I. R. Monday night and lodged in jail in spite of their pleadings and protestations.

—Black's Block will be ready for occupation next week. The tenants on the lower flat will be Halston, Grocer, Mrs. Rent, Milliner, Halifax Bank, and J. W. Crawford, Bookkeeper. One store is not yet rented. The second flat will be occupied by R. S. Pridham, E. L. Fuller, Dr. Dobson, W. and Fred. Donkin. The upper flat has been fitted up as an Oddfellows Hall.

—During the past fortnight A. Robb & Sons have turned out over four carloads of machinery consisting of Hercules engines, Monarch boilers and rotary saw mills. They have under construction four rotary mills, one to go to Quebec, one to Cape Breton, and two will be used in Nova Scotia. The firm have just received an order from B. Young, of Los Angeles, California for a rotary mill to be placed in his mill at Halfway River. They have inconspicuously proved their Hercules engines and Monarch boilers are being received with more favor than any other mill machinery now made, and they have more than doubled their output in these lines during the past year.

—James E. Page, of the enterprising firm of J. E. Page & Sons, farmers and importers of thoroughbred stock, died on Saturday last, after a lingering illness. Mr. Page was one of the most progressive and enterprising farmers of the county, and was the first to introduce the mowing machine and other labor-saving machinery. He was also quick to perceive the advantages of possessing thoroughbred stock, and after careful comparison fixed upon Holstein cattle as the best for his specialities. The excellent judgment shown in this matter is proved by the results, and the firm can now boast of having some of the finest animals in the classes mentioned to be found in the Dominion. Mr. Page's funeral, which took place Monday afternoon, was very largely attended, and was conducted by Amherst Council of the Royal Arcanum, of which the deceased was a member. The Municipal Council adjourned their session till the day after tomorrow, as the funeral and interment of a body. The services at the house were conducted by Rev. D. A. Steele and Rev. Mr. McGregor.

—The Municipal Council have been in session since Tuesday of last week, and will close their labors to-day. A most interesting discussion took place on Monday afternoon in reference to the site of the new Court House. A motion that the building should be erected on the old site at Amherst had been carried by a vote of 10 to 5. It was then moved that the site be changed to the site at Spring Hill. A number of the leading people of Oxford had backed their motion, and in an effort to furnish ground for the site and by agreement to pay the sum set off opposite their names towards the cost of erecting the Court House in their town. Then followed a number of figures aggregating 4,900, but there was no time to discuss the matter at the polls. After a long, interesting and eloquent discussion the question was put to vote, and after the amendments had been defeated the original motion was carried by a vote of seventeen to four.
