HORSEMEN ARE BUSY.

Fredericton Trotting Park Meeting to be Held Next Week to Make Plans.

Gallagher Bros. Lease the Woodstock Track and Will Have Races in July.

JIMMIE GALLAGHER'S FINE STABLE OF FAST ONES.

On Monday notices for the annual meeting of the Fredericton Trotting Park Association will be issued and it is likely that the meeting will take place next week. The meeting will be one of importance inasmuch as this promises to be an exceptionally strenuous year for harness racing not only in this city but in the Maritime Provinces. The Association is booked to have races during the first week in July and they will be one of features of the Freemen's Tournament and Old Home Week Celebration. Two days of good racing is promised with all the best horses in the provinces and Eastern Maine here to compete. The Association's track is now a busy place with a big string of horses there in charge of Trainer Lew Cox, concerning whom the American Horse Breeder speaks as follows:—

Trainer Lew Cox is located in Fredericton, N. B., with a string of horses. We understand that he has been selected to train and drive Terrace Queen (2:06), who will be campaigned in the free-for-alls this season. I can assure the Fredericton boys that Lew will treat them squarely, drive to win and take proper care of their horses. There is some talk of holding a race meeting here during one of the few vacant weeks in the Maritime Horsemen's Association circuit towards the latter part of the season, but whether this will come off depends to a large extent upon the success of the first meeting.

Races for Woodstock Second Week in July. While at Woodstock recently Mr. James Gallagher, of Gallagher Bros., told the writer that he would give the Fredericton Trotting Park Association several entries for the meeting here in July and said that Carleton County would be well represented not only in the field of horses but also in the crowd of spectators, as the people there are already arranging to patronize the excursion train that leaves Houlton and Woodstock on the morning of Dominion Day.

The Woodstock track will be a busy place this season and until the opening of the racing season there promises to be lots of working there by fast ones that will make all the rest of them hustle by the time the bell rings. Jimmie Gallagher is preparing to go right down the circuit with a racing stable that will open the eyes of some of them.

Gertie Glen Will be Raced Again This Season.

The beautiful and speedy race mare Gertie Glen, a grand 2:31 class candidate, will be in the game again this season and the veteran Joe Hal is also being put in training.

Gallagher Bros. Have Leased Woodstock Trotting Park.

Gallagher Bros. have signed a lease for the Woodstock Trotting Park for another five years, after having held the property for the past ten years. During the past two years the Woodstock meeting has been the Sussex track bucking against it, but this year they will be free from opposition and have decided to hold the races the second week in July. The horses will go from here to Woodstock and there should be large fields of horses and well patronized races.

Then Andy Williams' good little horse that made such a fine showing in the races here last fall will be started again this year. Brown Dick is a good racing proposition and should put in a successful season.

A black gelding out of a mare by Dufferin and sired by Baron Alameda is called Thunderhammer. He will be started by Mr. Gallagher this year if he shows the turn of speed that there is thought to be in him.

Jay Wilkes, by Pure Wilkes and out of the Emeline mare, Carrie R., 2:18, will be "wound up" again for 1906. This one is owned by Frawley Bros., of St. George, Charlotte County, and should be a lively one for the green classes. Jay Wilkes was conditioned last season but met with an accident just about the time for starting.

Alfordley Stock Looks Good

The get of Alfordley 2:12 will play an important part in the stables of Gallagher Bros. this summer. Alfordley is owned by Mr. Tweedie of Carleton County and is a remarkable horse. As a three year old Alfordley made ten starts and landed seven first monies.

Prince Alfordley is a bay stallion, three years old and by Alfordley (2:12) and out of Carrie R. (2:38) one of the Emeline mares. He is as pretty as a picture, with nice action and as a two year old last summer stepped a half in 1:21.

THE PEOPLE PAY.

Canada's Surplus for Ten Months of This Year \$18,000,000.

OTTAWA, May 4.—The statement of revenue and expenditure for the ten months ended with April shows a revenue of \$83,838,330, or an increase of \$8,077,708 over the same time in the previous year. The expenditure for the ten months was \$65,838,499, an increase of \$2,900,322 over the year. The capital expenditure was \$10,431,700, an increase of \$1,331,000. This increase was in public works and bounties. Every department of revenue contributed to the increase in revenue. The increase for the revenue for the month of April was a little more than \$1,000,000, and the expenditure was about the same as for April, 1905.

MIND UNBALANCED

By Recent Occurrences a San Francisco Man Cuts His Throat.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 5.—Captain F. B. Webster of the 20th Infantry, 32 years old, attempted to end his life yesterday by cutting his throat with a bayonet from a rifle. He was taken to the Presidio Hospital. The physicians say he may recover. The attempted suicide was apparently the result of an unbalanced mind from overwork. He had been on duty in the burned area since the earthquake.

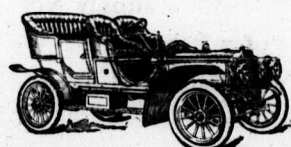

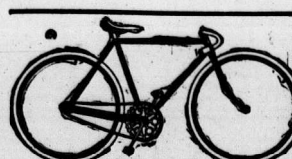
