CANADIANS ONLY.

Detroit Contractors Cannot Have Civic Contracts in Windsor.

Windsor, Ont., May 11.—The City Council last night reaffirmed its stand against Detroit contractors and Detroit labor being permitted to have municipal contracts in Windsor. Todd & Co. had secured a ten thousand dollar contract for sidewalks to be laid in the city this summer, their bid being several hundred dollars below the next lowest one. It was alleged that Mr. Todd was connected with a Detroit firm, and the intention at first was to re-advertise, but after a long discussion the contract was allowed to stand with the proviso that it become void if it was found later that any Detroit firm was interested in it.

MISS KRAFT

Broke Down When She Met Her Brother in Jail.

Windsor, Ont., May 11.—Disappointed in her hope that the Richard Kraft, who shot up the Windsor police station and wounded three persons when arrested for stealing a bicycle last Friday was not her brother, Miss Kraft, of Berlin, broke down completely when she faced her kin in the Sandwich jail yesterday. The meeting between the brother and sister was a affecting one. The prisoner expressed fear that the shock would be fatal to his mother. Miss Kraft told the police that her parents had considerable social distinction in Germany, but had lived quietly since coming to this country. The prisoner is an only son, and has caused them some anxiety in the past. All Kraft's victims are improving rapidly.

HAINS JURY IS NOW OUT.

Both Sides Expect a Favorable Verdict in the Case.

Counsel for the Prisoner and Judge Address the Jury.

Trial May Result in Hains Going to Insane Asylum.

Flushing, L. I., May 11.—The case against Peter C. Hains, jun., charged with the murder of Wm. E. Annis, was expected when court opened to-day to be given to the jury by noon.

Ex-District Attorney George A. Gregg, who had not finished his summing up of the State's case when court adjourned yesterday, expected to conclude his argument in about an hour, after which the charge of Justice Garretson to the jury will be in order. The Judge has announced that this would occupy about an hour. Anxiety as to the verdict of the jury prevailed among the counsel for both State and the defence before the opening of the court.

John F. McIntyre, of counsel for Capt. Hains, said that from his study of the jury he was certain that eight of its members would vote for acquittal, while the remaining four were doubtful. District Attorney Dewitt said that he expected a conviction.

In the event of Capt. Hains' acquittal on the grounds of insanity at the time he shot Annis, the case would go to the Yacht Club last August, the question of his present mental state arises. Mr. McIntyre has not hesitated to say that he believes his client is insane at the present time. Should Justice Garretson share this belief, he might issue an order for the defendant to be confined in a State institution for the insane until he is pronounced cured.

Resuming his remarks to the jury to-day, Mr. Gregg read from the testimony of the defence's alienists in which they state the defendant was suffering from "impulsive insanity" when he shot Annis and that the attack subsided as soon as the act was committed.

"Now what kind of insanity do you call that?" said the prosecutor. "I ask you to use your own good common sense in determining whether this man was insane on Aug. 15, 1908."

Gen. Hains and Mrs. Hains, the defendant's parents, came into court soon after Mr. Gregg resumed his remarks.

The prosecutor declared that General Hains and Thornton Hains had taken refuge behind the answer, "I don't remember," while under cross-examination.

"We could never get any of the rational speeches of Capt. Hains out of them," said Mr. Gregg. "Only the glassy eyes, the twitching face and the shuffling walk."

Mr. Gregg finished his argument at 12:40 a. m.

During the delivery of the charge of Justice Garretson, "but there was no intention of the evidence in the case, and warned the jurors against being swayed one way or the other by their sympathies."

The jurors remained standing during the first part of Justice Garretson's charge on fair and impartial consideration of the evidence in the case, and warned the jurors against being swayed one way or the other by their sympathies.

"The jury has the right, from the records, to find an intent to kill," said Justice Garretson, "but there must not only be an intent, but also a premeditated and deliberate design to kill." The court defined murder in the first and second degree and manslaughter. He said there was nothing in the record on which the jury would assume that the defendant's act was justifiable or excusable.

"Is there premeditation in this case?" asked the court. "That is for you to decide after a careful study of all the evidence. If you find no premeditation it is your duty to consider whether the defendant's act comes within the definition of murder in the second degree."

"One may be guilty of manslaughter in the first degree who kills on the impulse of the moment in the heat of passion or because of a peculiar set of circumstances which confront him."

Justice Garretson defined a reasonable doubt, and said it must be a mere impression, but a moral certainty of the doubt.

THE JURY OUT.

The Hains case was given to the jury at 12:05 p. m.

PURE MILK FOR BABIES.

Board of Health is Working Out a Good Plan.

Prevention of Tuberculosis Convention Here Next Week.

Street Railway Co. Will Not Delay Barton St. Work.

A business-like effort will be made by the Board of Health this year to lessen the appalling death rate among infants in the hot summer months. During July and August of last year nearly a hundred of them died and in a majority of cases the doctors declare death was due to the milk supply and improper feeding. The plan mapped out by a sub-committee of the Board of Health last night, it is believed, will cut the death rate in half and the cost will not exceed \$1,000. It is proposed to select a farm, where the surroundings are all that could be desired, and arrange for a milk supply. A nurse or inspector will be appointed to see that the milk is carefully handled, properly bottled and delivered in the city at some central station. It will be sold at actual cost. The slogan will be "Pure Milk for Babies," and five thousand booklets with instructions on how to feed babies will be distributed. The Board of Health emphasizes the fact that it is not going into competition with any of the milk dealers. The milk to be sold under its supervision will likely cost a little more than the milk delivered around the city. The Finance Committee of the City Council will be asked to supply part of the funds. The Hamilton Medical Association is heartily in sympathy with the movement and has appointed a committee to act with the Board of Health.

In connection with the annual convention of the Canadian Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis which will be held on Wednesday and Thursday of next week, Dr. Roberts, Medical Health Officer, is anxious to arrange to have the Ontario tuberculosis exhibit shown here. If sufficient funds can be raised to secure the Bennett Theatre for Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday, the exhibit will be secured. The management of the theatre has offered the use of the house at the cost of opening it. The idea is to have an illustrated lecture each afternoon and evening, the lectures from the Public Schools attending in the afternoon. The exhibit itself would be displayed in the City Hall or some central place and the children after hearing the lecture would be able to appreciate it. In Montreal last year this exhibit was shown and attracted a great deal of attention. Whether it can be secured for Hamilton depends on the generosity of some of the citizens.

If the scheme to take in the Jockey Club grounds with the other portion of Barton township east of Sherman avenue, which it is expected will shortly be annexed, materializes, the city will be in a position to get considerable more revenue than if only the territory first proposed was taken in. It is believed that the city could collect a license fee from the Jockey Club, and from the Maple Leaf Amusement Company, in ad-

dition to assessing the property for water rates on a different basis. There would also be the Truman and Jockey Club license fees, of which the city would get a part. Although the number of licenses in Hamilton is limited to 67 as a result of the legislation by the Council this year, the action of the Commissioners in cutting the number down to 64, removes the difficulty if these two licenses are added.

The assessment of the territory, exclusive of the Jockey Club grounds, which it is proposed to annex, is \$750,000.

City officials stated this morning that they had the assurance of the Street Railway Company that there was no intention to stop the re-construction work after James street was finished. One reason for putting on the night gangs is to rush the work along so that Barton street can be completed before the middle of July.

Indications are that the new Carnegie Library will not be built for some time. Members of the Board say that as a result of the suggestions about sites that appeared in last paper the prices were jumped up when it was found the Library Board wanted the property. The Board does not propose to pay an exorbitant price, and is willing to take its time.

The Finance Committee of the Board of Education yesterday passed accounts and decided to ask the Board for permission to advertise for tenders for supplies.

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The annual meeting of the Hamilton Camera Club was held last evening in the club rooms. After the presentation of reports, which showed that the club is in good shape, the election of officers for the ensuing year was proceeded with, and resulted as follows:
