

FORMAL OPENING OF 1926 EXHIBITION

Lieut.-Governor Officially Opens the Annual Fair—Prospects of Good Weather.

At 1 o'clock Tuesday a beautiful afternoon in prospect and everything in readiness for a successful day of pleasure, the Edmonton exhibition of 1926 was declared open by His Honor Lieutenant Governor Bulfinch, in the presence of directors of the association, judges and spectators, who crowded around the grand stand where his honor stood. He was escorted to the grounds and attended by a guard of honor chosen from A squadron Alberta rifles, under command of Sgt. Major Hopkins. The guard of honor was composed of 12 non-commissioned officers and men and one trumpeter. The governor's aides were Major Saunders, Capt. Wootley and Lieut. Forster. Music was furnished by the citizens' band, who looked trim in their new uniforms and furnished good music.

His honor the lieutenant governor in opening referred to the prospects of a bountiful harvest and the magnificent growing weather with which the fair was blessed. The great need at the present time was sunshine and warmth and Alberta, he was sure, could be true to her traditions in this regard. The prospects were that the fair would be a great success. The display of cattle was larger than ever before, the horses were of a better class than ever shown here and the races gave every indication of being the best ever seen in this part of the province. He then formally declared the exhibition of 1926 formally opened, amid the cheers of the spectators and the playing of the band.

The great feature attraction was the horse races and for an opening day the attendance at these was large. The performance in front of the grand stand included two trick bicycle riders and two expert rifle shots. The fairs that both performed were liberally applauded.

During the afternoon, contests in jumping over barriers were conducted and a large number took part with varying success. A horse owned by C. J. Robert was the star performer. Outside the race course there are a large number of side shows but none up to the present time appears to be of an objectionable nature. The judges are being liberally patronized before and after the races.

Stock judging began yesterday at one o'clock and continued all the afternoon and evening. The judges were in the highest terms of the quality of the live stock shown. The dining hall on the grounds are kept by the Ladies' Aid of Grace Methodist church, the Church of the Immaculate Conception, and the Church of the Holy Trinity. The Pythians, Jasper lodge 6, and Edmonton lodge 22, erected a tent for the entertainment of visiting knights and their friends. The tent is to the south of the sidewalk, a short distance from the entrance.

Police headquarters are situated near the entrance and the fire department have their station further in on the east side.

Those who are exhibiting in the manufacture of hats are, even, graver and jeweller, C. W. Ribbester, carriage manufacturer, J. Y. Griffin and Co., pork packers; the Royal Manufacturing company, of Winnipeg. In the exhibition hall are Dr. Parney, engraver, who has two booths; Messrs. Howard and Smith, Mason & Rich Piano Co., Canadian Marzle and Granite works, Singer Sewing machine, Edmonton brewer, R. Drenett, glass engraver.

Track in Fair Condition.
The Edmonton Exhibition association Tuesday afternoon presented one of the best first days racing in the history of the district fairs. There was a good attendance for the first day, and after one light shower during the first heat of the green race the sky cleared and the remainder of the afternoon was ideal for horse racing.

The track was not in the best condition, being very rough in places, but despite this there was a good spring to the surface of the oval. In view of its condition the results made in the different events was excellent. The array of horses entered made up the best list of horses that have ever come together in this city. Western Canada was well represented, Prince Albert, Regina, Calgary and Wetaskiwin sending competitors, while from the United States the stock farms of California, Ohio and Idaho had a number of fine specimens of racing horses.

In the division of the spoils of victory the Edmonton horses got only a small share yesterday. Regina took the cream of the prize money, winning both the trotting races, Prince Albert and Wetaskiwin getting second money in the green and 2.25 to 2.30 respectively. In the running events, Ohio and California carried off the first and second in the 7-8 dash, and Wetaskiwin and Edmonton first and second in the pony race.

Green Trot or Pace (First Heat).
In this race there were six entries. They drew positions as follows: Al Andubon, owned by Charles Wilson, Regina, pole; Annex Jr. owned by W. H. McKinley, Edmonton, second; Wilkes Bar, owned by Geo. Haig, Calgary, third; Medura, owned by D. C. Peverett, Regina, fourth; Sam Toy, owned by A. J. Bell, Prince Albert, fifth; and May Hal, owned by J. W. Hanson, Prince Albert, sixth.

Annex Jr. took the lead at the "go" but was pressed hard by Wilkes Bar with Medura in third position. The others were well bunched in the rear. For the seven-eighths it was a close race between Annex and Wilkes Bar, but rounding into the home stretch, Medura, who was trotting prettily, easily took the lead from both, and won out without difficulty. Sam Toy came a close second, having passed the leaders at the half, and May Hal third position, with Wilkes Bar fifth. Al Andubon was badly distanced. Time, 2:30.

Second Heat.
On the fourth race the horses were sent off with a good start. From the first it appeared to be a race between Medura and Sam Toy, the winners of the first heat, and Wilkes Bar, who was at the half. At the three-fourths Sam Toy broke, and was passed by May Hal, who, in turn, was passed by Wilkes Bar, who led in the stretch, but could not overtake Medura, the gamy Regina mare. In the second half Wilkes Bar, who was badly in the rear for the first quarter, managed to wrest fourth place from Annex, but was put back by the judges for running. This ended the race, which was best two in three heats, first money going to Medura, second to Sam Toy, the Prince Albert gelding, and third to May Hal, a Prince Albert mare.

Medura was afterwards protested as not being eligible. Time 2:31.
2.30 Pace, 2.25 Trot (First Heat).
In this race there were nine starters, necessitating the horses being sent off in two bunches. The horses who faced the wire were as follows: Lucky Pete, owned by J. C. Calhoun, Edmonton, pole; Philip W. owned by L. O. Olson, Wetaskiwin; Little Cora, owned by Chas. Wilson, Regina; Lorie owned by T. E. Hall, Prince Albert; Omie, owned by G. W. Hoton, La Combe; Don M., owned by Dr. A. A. Hodge, Calgary; The Indian, owned by Parolow & Haig, Calgary; Ruby H., owned by Geo. A. Rydale, Wetaskiwin; and Karlwood, owned by John H. Knudsen, Prince Albert.

There was a good deal of scoring before the horses got off. At the first turn, Little Cora went to the lead, holding it throughout, trotting the mile without lifting her nose. Lucky Pete held second position to the half but was passed by The Indian, who held the second position for the remainder of the race. The other horses were scattered out, but several pairs made nice contests. Lucky Pete, who went back to third at the half, held that position to the end of the race. Philip W. was the main rival of the leader, but was out of the race at the three-fourths place. Ruby H. fifth, Lorie sixth, Omie seventh, and Don M. eighth. Time, 2:29 1/4.

The Matinee Races.
The matinee races in the evening, under the direction of the Edmonton Driving Club, were well contested and furnished some good trials of speed. In class A, Ranger, owned by P. D. McKenzie, Edmonton, secured first money, winning two heats. In class B, Bob Switzer, owned by R. Taylor, Regina, secured first money, winning two heats.

Third Heat.
The third heat of the 2.30 pace, 2.25 trot, was the first of the season. The horses were sent off in the first heat well bunched together. Philip W. and The Indian, who had been in the first heat, were again in the first heat, but this time Philip W. broke at the start, and The Indian pulled out ahead of the rest, winning the first heat. Time, 2:27 1/4.

Fourth Heat.
In the fourth heat of the 2.30 pace, 2.25 trot, the three winners of first places in the previous heats were starters. The Indian, the Calgary bay horse; Philip W., the brown Welsh mare; and Little Cora, the Regina mare. There was considerable scoring before the trio got off, with the Indian slightly in lead. Philip W. broke at the start, but held her second position. At the quarter, Little Cora went up to first place, but lost it again at the turn. Coming into the final stretch, Philip W. took the lead, and though closely pressed by Little Cora, held it to the wire. The Indian finished a good third. Time, 2:27 1/4.

Fifth Heat.
In the fifth and last heat of the 2.25 to 2.30 Philip W. came to the wire with two firsts to his credit, and The Indian and Little Cora one each. They got away well together on the second score. The three were well bunched in the stretch. Little Cora and Philip W. were neck and neck, but the heat and race was given to the former, whose showing for the five heats was in the green and 2.25 to 2.30 respectively. In the running events, Ohio and California carried off the first and second in the 7-8 dash, and Wetaskiwin and Edmonton first and second in the pony race.

The Running Races.
There were two running races, the 7-8 mile dash and the quarter mile for ponies, 1-2 hands and under, 2 in 3. For the first time in the history of the fair, the quarter mile race was run. The winner was Little Cora, owned by Chas. Wilson, Regina. Time, 1:13 1/2.

was not a great improvement in the old method, either in the time taken up in starting or in getting all the horses away, several being left on the mark in each race.

Seven-Eighths Mile Dash.
In the seven-eighths of a mile dash there were seven starters. Col. Bronston, owned by the Clear Lake stable, Spokane, Wash.; Buckingham, owned by R. M. Barber, Strathcona; Judge Landy, owned by Frank Campbell, Edmonton; Malar, G. P. McNeil, Emeryville, Cal.; Sam McGibbon, J. A. Lynch, Emeryville, Cal.; Gentle Zephyr, W. H. Eggleston, Wetaskiwin; Alta Spa, C. Earl Oak, Cal. There was a great deal of delay in making this start and eventually a false start was given, and a number of the runners went the entire half mile before they were called back. The bunch were eventually sent off and a close race following Judge Landy winning first; Alta Spa second, and Colonel Bronston, who was left on the mark at the start third. On his performance if the third horse had got away, the bunch he should have won out, as he was neck and neck with the second, as it was, and only a length behind the first. Time, 1:36.

Pony Race, 1 1/4 Hands.
For the pony race there were five starters. Trimming, owned by J. C. Calhoun, Edmonton; Little Jim, owned by J. C. Shinnars, Edmonton; Black Bess, owned by C. D. Howell, Wetaskiwin; Helen B., owned by O. F. Burnett, Tofteld; and Malar, G. P. McNeil, Emeryville, Cal. The two heats went to the Wetaskiwin mare, Black Bess. Suffolk Boy got a second and third, and money and Helen B. with a fifth and second, third money. Times: 28 seconds and 28 3/4 seconds.

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2.30 Trot (First Heat).
In this race there were nine starters. Frisby, owned by Joe Elliott, Edmonton; Ranger, owned by P. D. McKenzie, Edmonton; Hartwood, owned by T. E. Battell, Moose Jaw; Dudley Daniels, owned by J. Hoffman, Moose Jaw; Ping Pong, owned by Parolow & Haig, Calgary; and Billy B., owned by H. Gordon, Golden, B.C. Daisy, owned by W. A. Scott, Edmonton; Long Spin, owned by H. E. Penelton, Ponoka; Fanny J., owned by J. T. Burnett, Tofteld; and La Tranta, owned by the Owl Stable, Baker City, Oregon. The horses got a good start, Frisby took the lead and won out handsomely, closely pressed by Ping Pong and Billy B. Time, 51 seconds.

Second Heat.
In the second heat La Tranta, a sixth place horse in the first heat, led the runners home with Long Spin in second place, Frisby third and Billy B. fourth. Young Pilgrim was neck and neck at the back stretch he lost at the turns and finished a length behind. Time, 50 seconds. La Tranta thus took first money, Young Pilgrim second and Frisby third.

3.5 Mile Selling.
This race was for three-year-olds and upwards, 5 lbs. below scales. Each horse entered to be sold for \$400. There were nine starters. Main, owned by the Clear Lake stable, Spokane, Wash.; Polnah, owned by E. Huxford, Seattle, Wash.; Head Dance, owned by J. A. Lynch, Emeryville, Cal.; Magnifico, owned by H. C. Covington, Boise City, Idaho; Otto Price, owned by Chas. Earl, Emeryville, Cal.; and May owned by W. A. Scott, Edmonton. The race went to Polnah, with Otto Price second and Head Dance third. Time, 1:04 4/5.

The Live Stock End of It.
Prof. Grisdale, of the Ottawa Experimental farm, opened proceedings in the show ring Tuesday afternoon at 1 o'clock, and by 6 o'clock had passed judgment on the Shorthorn, Hereford, Red Polled and Polled Angus breeds. The entries, on a general rule, were sufficiently large to make competition keen, and a large number of interested spectators followed the judging in spite of the attraction on the bank course. The agricultural end of the show was very well maintained, and the show ring was a good deal of the show stock of the district at a summer fair.
