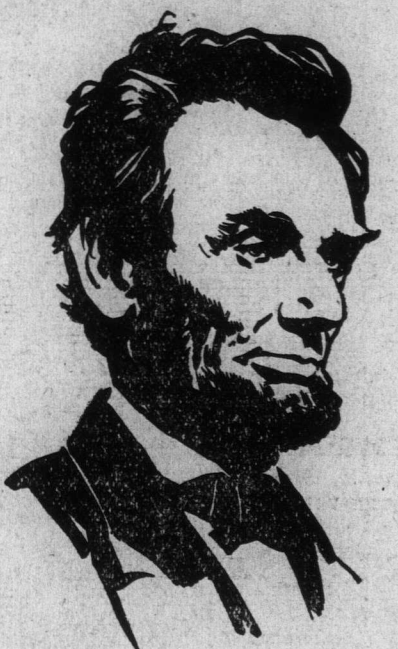
OCTOBER 25.

## Patriotic Association.

A meeting of the General Commit-  
tee of the Patriotic Association was  
held in the C.I.B. Armory last even-  
ing. His Excellency the Governor pre-  
siding, and among others present  
were: Right Hon. the Premier, Sir  
Joseph Outerbridge, Sir William Hor-  
wood, Justice Johnson, Hon. E. R.  
Bowring, Hon. M. G. Winter, Hon. W.  
C. Job, Hon. M. P. Cashin, Mr. J. M.  
Kent, K.C., Mr. J. S. Munn, Hon. R.  
A. Squires, Hon. J. R. Bennett, Hon.  
S. D. Blandford, Mr. W. E. Grieve, J.  
A. Clift, K.C., I. G. Sullivan, W. J.  
Higgins, M.H.A., Capt. Montgomery,  
Lieut.-Col. Conroy, K.C., Lieut.-Col.  
Rendell, Hon. John Harvey.  
After the minutes of the previous  
meeting were read by Dr. Burke and  
confirmed, His Excellency the Govern-  
or spoke of the embarkation from  
here of the Nfld. Regiment, and the  
pleasant voyage and safe arrival at  
Plymouth. He said the delay in the  
sailing of the transport ship Florizel  
was due to waiting to make connec-  
tion with the ships conveying the Cana-  
dian troops. Continuing, he said  
that the Transport Committee had  
negotiated for another ship, but did  
not succeed and it was through the  
instrumentality of Hon. E. R. Bow-  
ring that the Florizel was procured  
and despite the fact that there was  
only a couple of days to get the ship  
ready, she carried out her work suc-  
cessfully.  
Sir Joseph Outerbridge said he had  
been told by Hon. J. A. Robinson that  
the Nfld. Volunteers were visited at  
Sallys Plains by Rev. James  
Bell, formerly of the C. E. Cathedral  
this city. In a message sent, Mr.  
Bell stated that our boys were in  
splendid condition.  
Mr. J. A. Clift, Secretary of the  
Nominating Committee, intimated  
that he had nothing further to add to  
the report previously submitted. This  
committee was then tendered a vote  
of thanks.  
On behalf of the Recruiting Com-  
mittee, Mr. A. J. Montgomery, sub-  
mitted his report, which was adopted.  
Speaking for the Camp Medical  
Staff, Dr. Macpherson made an oral  
report on the work done, and intimated  
that some of the recruits had  
been inoculated against typhoid.  
Mr. W. H. Rennie, on behalf of the  
Musket Committee, reported that  
only 23 out of 550 were found inca-  
pable of shooting. That was consid-  
ered an excellent showing.  
On motion of His Excellency, a vote  
of thanks was tendered to the Rifle  
Association, also to Lieut. Commander  
McDermott, of H.M.S. Calypso, who  
assisted in the training of our boys.  
A lengthy report was received  
from Capt. Outerbridge, of the Equip-  
ment Committee, mentioning that  
most of the borrowed tents had been  
obtained. A few had been destroyed  
by storms and in this connection ar-  
rangements were being made.  
The Selecting Committee, through  
Sir Joseph Outerbridge, stated they  
had nothing further to report.  
A detailed statement of all accounts  
so far as presented by Hon. E. R.  
Bowring, of the Finance Committee,  
who suggested that a regimental of-  
fice be established here while our  
volunteers are away. Mr. Bowring's  
report was adopted and Messrs.  
Munn, Harris and McGrath were se-  
lected as a permanent committee.  
His Excellency announced that Dr.  
Wakefield had kindly offered his stip-  
end to the Patriotic Fund while with  
the Nfld. Regiment.  
The matter of training more men  
was then talked of. The Premier  
stated that the Government did not  
want to have any unnecessary ex-  
pense incurred, though if another 500  
men were needed, the expense would  
have to be borne. Regarding the  
maintenance of a Home Defense  
Force, he thought that men should  
be put in training and drill instruc-  
tors appointed. These he thought  
to go under training should be be-  
tween the age of 18 and 36 years and  
that they should enlist without pay.  
Mr. J. M. Kent, K.C., offered his  
co-operation in any movement which  
was in the interests of the Empire.  
His Excellency suggested that the  
commanding officers of the four city  
brigades, in addition to Sir Joseph  
Outerbridge as Chairman, and Mes-  
srs. A. Clift, W. J. Higgins, W. H.  
Rennie, A. J. Montgomery, E. Ayre  
and Dr. Burke be appointed as a Re-  
cruiting Committee.
