From then she slowly became worse, bearing her agony with unexampled patience. She was held in the highest esteem by all who knew her, especially by the Sisters of the Convent and her school chums, the proof of which was the home to enquire about Mary.

During her illness all that medical skill could do was done by Dr. McKendrick, but to no avail; she was only awaiting the call of Him who knows best. Mrs. Beardon was with her the day of her death and gave her the Last Rites of her church, and just as he left her, she closed her eyes and died as if going to sleep. On Saturday her funeral took place, and in the midst of a heavy rainstorm she was buried in Mt. Carmel Cemetery, there to await the Resurrection morn. To her sorrowing father, mother, brothers and sisters, the writer voices the sentiments of Placentia in expressing heartfelt sympathy.
