Train Strikes Auto Truck.

AT GRADE CROSSING AND 14 PERSONS KILLED.

WOODBURY, Pa., Nov. 2.—14 persons were killed and 13 injured, some of them seriously in a grade crossing accident at Clarkesboro, eight miles from here, late last night, when a Pennsylvania railroad train struck an automobile truck load of masqueraders. Twelve of the victims were killed instantly and two others died at the Cooper hospital, Camden. Two of them were women. All of the dead and injured were from the Kensington mill district of Philadelphia. There were 32 persons in the truck. They were returning home after attending a Halloween party at Hillingsport. The accident occurred in a driving rain; and it is believed the driver failed to see the approaching train until it was too late to stop.


