Untold Wealth Missing.

This same difficulty of marketing is also true, though perhaps in a lesser degree, of the other crown But unquestionably there was untold wealth in Russian in the personally owned stones of the imperial family, the nobility and wealthy bourgeoise.

Undoubtedly the most romantic and at the same time most tragic of the authenticated stories of the Russian jewels is the one involving the murder of the Czar. Czarina, Charevitch and other members of the imperial family in the suburbs of Ekaterinburg, their last place of imprison-

The Jewels found by the committee investigating the murder were turned over, it is understood, to surviving members of the imperial family. Of those, however, which the murderers took from the bodies of their victims, there is little definite trace. It is known that some were sent by the Bolsheviki to Scandinavia, where they were sold and the money used

in propaganda work. Among this lot was a big platinum and diamond pendant with a large black pearl set in the centre. It belonged to the Czarina, being also a gift from the Czar, and was one of her favorite ornaments. This piece, which was last sold for more than \$10,000, changed hands a number of times and finally was bought by a wealthy Scandinavian and presented to a London actress to whom he was engaged.

Taking No Chances.

But despite the apparent mystery regarding the whereabouts of the bulk of the Russian crown jewels, the European governments are taking no chances of future complications with the first Russian Government which will be recognized by them. The various customs services, police and de tective forces are constantly on the watch for the appearance of any of the famous gems. No sale of any of the Russian crown jewels would be recognized as legal at this time. Only a Russian government recognized by the foreign powers gen erally would be allowed to dis them in foreign countries. Persons to-day who huy any of the



## Ice Harvesting.

Quite a number of men are now W. Clouston engaged harvesting ice from Long W. Rodger Pond. Messrs. Cluney and King are J. Angel cutting for the Butterine Factory, W. T. Shirran while Mr. Hanlon is getting a supply for the General Hospital and Mc-Total for Blues 56. Total for Reds 66. Guire's Bakery. Mr. Quigley begins cutting for 'Horwood's some time next week. About 14 teams are engaged hauling the supply, some 850 tons, for the Butterine Factory. In all about 2,400 tons of ice will be removed from the pond this year. In some parts of the pond the ice is 14 inches thick and the work of cutting is somewhat difficult. Ice ploughs are used to some extent, but most of the cutting is done with saws, axes and ice bars. The plough scoring to a depth of eight inches, is usually run the length of the opening or reast, and generally about 3 feet from the edge, forming a block perhaps 40 feet long. This is then notched with an axe into blocks two feet wide and then sawn through to meet the cut made by the ice ploughs. Ice bars are next used to break the blocks clear. These are then poled to a gangway, where they are caught with tongs or grips and pulled up by horse power.
