Parade Ground for Athletics.

Last night the Executive of the mateur Athletic Association, conisting of President G. W. B. Ayre, Treasurer C. E. Hunt, Secretary P. Frace, with Mr. T. W. Sparkes, representing the Football League; V.P., C. E. Jeffery and Secretary J. M. Tobin, of the Hockey League; President John B. Orr and Mr. F. V. Chesman, of the Baseballers attended at the City Hall, and were met by the members of the Municipal Council. The object of the meeting was to arrange for the handing over by the City of the Parade Ground to the Newfoundland Amateur Athletic Association. Mayor Morris welcmoed the delegation and pointed out that provisions had been made in the Charter that this piece of property was to be reserved for the use of the city, either as a park or a public recreation ground. In closing, the Mayor said that after due deliberation and consideration and on the advice of Mr. E. Leo Carter, the Council's Solicitor, the Commission had unanimously decided to give the Association all the rights and powers which they possessed of the Parade Ground. President Ayre, on behalf of the A.A.A., thanked the Mayor and Councillors for the interest they had shown in the advancement of athletics. He said that he was authorized by the Association to meet the Council's generosity by offering two per cent. of the gate receipts so that the city will derive a revenue where to-day they derive none. A general discussion then ensued in which Councillors Peet, Vinicombe, Jackman, Solicitor Carter and the various delegates took part. Treasurer C. E.
