Who Beheaded King Charles I?

NOBODY WAS THE EXECUTIONER. There is an old riddle still asked, "where did the executioner of Charles I have his dinner that day?" And the answer is: "He had a chop at the 'King's Hotel' in Westminster."

When Charles II came to the throne, among the twenty-nine people tried for bringing about the death of his royal father was a man, William Hulet, accused of having struck the fatal blow.

And yet, of all those twenty-nine, he was the one man who escaped the death sentence. He implored the King's forgiveness.

Before the execution of the King, Hulet had been a sergeant under a Colonel Hewson. Three days before the execution the colonel sent for thirty-eight of his men, including Hulet, and after swearing them to secrecy, asked who would volunteer to be the king's executioner, the reward being £100 and promotion.

To a man they refused, and that seemed an end of the matter as far as that regiment was concerned.

But one of the thirty-eight men, in giving evidence afterwards, stated that, when watching the execution, he recognized Hulet by his grey beard, despite the mask he wore, and by his voice when he fell on his knees and implored forgiveness of the king before beheading him.

After the execution Hulet was promoted to the rank of captain-lieutenant, and in his regiment he was henceforth known as Father Greybeard.

Repleved After Verdict of "GUILTY." Another witness at the trial against Hulet swore that nine years after the execution Hulet confessed to him that he had performed the duty of headman Hulet at once denied this, and claimed most strongly that if the opportunity was granted him he would be able to prove an alibi for the time of the execution.

A further witness, Colonel Axell, himself condemned to death, stated that Hulet and a man named Walker were on the scaffold at the time. Walker delivered the fatal blow, and Hulet picked up the head to show to the crowd.

Hulet himself, in giving evidence, swore that, for refusing to behead the king, he, with nine other sergeants, was imprisoned, and pleaded that they might be brought forward to support him.

The jury to a man brought in a verdict of "guilty," but almost immediately the court had him reprieved without giving any explanation.

So the executioner of Charles I remains unknown to this day.

Synthetic Gold.

A considerable sensation was recently caused by a rumor that a German chemist had discovered a method of producing gold from another metal—possibly copper. Later reports proved that it was only a rumor; the great secret of making gold is still undiscovered.

As most of us are aware, the chemists—alchemists as they were called—of the middle ages spent their lives in searching for methods of manufacturing gold from cheaper or baser minerals. Fifty years ago their efforts were regarded as merely ludicrous by the scientists of the day; but our views have widened, and today it is realized that it is only a matter of time and research before the transmutation of metals is an accomplished fact.

So long ago as 1907 that great chemist, Sir William Ramsay, did actually affect a transmutation by means of a gas evolved from radium. Only in this case, what he did was to degrade copper down to the first member of its group of metals, namely "lithium."

About the same date three members of the French Society of Modern Alchemy were announced to have succeeded in making a synthetic thesis of gold. In other words they had built up gold out of its constituents.

Gold, of course, is still considered to be an element; that is, a simple substance which cannot be broken up. But scientists are beginning to have their doubts as to the so-called elements, and to believe that they are all built up out of one primal substance.

The result of a successful synthesis of gold would be to upset the whole system of the world's commerce, and we should have to find some other medium of exchange. For the time being the upset would be terrific.

Household Notes.

A six-pound electric iron is the best to choose for laundry work, because it holds the heat longer. The cake and bread box should be cleaned every week and scalded with hot water and baking soda. Never wash paint or enamel with soap and water, but make a weak mixture of vinegar and cold water and slip a chamotte leather into it. Wring the leather dry and polish paint with it; this takes out stains and puts on instead of removing polish.

Household Notes. Serve seeded raisins and chopped green peppers marinated with French dressing on crisp lettuce leaves. Canned wild fruit, such as blueberries and huckleberries, make delicious winter pies and puddings. If melted paraffin is poured over the cut end of a ham, it will not mold and will keep indefinitely. Both the stems and the leaves of Swiss chard are excellent for canning. They are generally put up separately. Old cloths make very nice aprons for kitchen and laundry work. Tape can be used to bind the edges. A long-handled soft brush is best for cleaning wall space out of reach, and it removes dust without rubbing it in.
