"'There is, as a matter of fact, not the slightest justification for the attempt of the Egyptians to upset the existing system of government in the Sudan, which has been established under the Anglo-Egyptian Convention of 1899, and which is working admirably.

"'The progress achieved in the Sudan under that system has been marvellous. The people of the Sudan have benefited enormously. Egypt has benefited owing to the fact that she Brother Walsh was transferred to has had a peaceful and prosperous neighbour on the south, instead of a savage and dangerous one, and owing to the increase of her trade with the Sudan. Great Britain, too, has derived benefit from the development of the Sudan, in which large sums of British capital have been invested. As we all know, there is a great prospect of the Sudan becoming a large cotton-producing country.

"'It seems to me wanton-I might almost say idiotic-to think of disturbing all this. The consequences of allowing it to be disturbed might be really terrible, possibly ending in a relapse of the Sudan into the terrible

The predominant position assured to us by this twofold title has een used by us for more than a nuarter of a century to restore that nmense region after the devastation wrought by the Mahdi and the Khalifa, and to endow it with an administraion suited to its peoples. They never enjoyed the semblance of tolerable government under the Khedives. Men ike Sir Samuel Baker and General Gordon said plainly that Egyptian methods had utterly ruined the Sudan, that the administration was mere 'brigandage,' and that the only reason why the Cairo Government kept possession of the region at all was for the sake of the highly lucrative slave trade. The horrors of the Dervish rule are not yet forgotten either in the Sudan itself or in Europe.
