Visit of the Governor-General. We are sure that the people of Guelph and surrounding country will be pleased to learn that the Governor-General intends to visit Guelph on Friday, the 21st inst. finishing his trip in the North • West, he purposes visiting Chicago on the 14th or 15th inst., and from thence will return to Canada by way of Detroit. He will then make a tour of the principal towns in Ontario, finishing up at Niagara, and from thence cross over to Toronto. The Mayor has called a special meet-ing of the Council for Tuesday night, when arrangements will be made for giving his Excellency a reception worthy of the town. We are sure our citizens will heartily co-operate with the Council in this matter.

How the Ballot worked in East Eigin.

It seems that the system of voting by ballot worked admirably at the East Elgin election on Thursday The ballot boxes, furnished by the Government, are of black walnut : there is a door at the top, secured by a lock, and in the door a slit through which the ballots are deposited. The slide covering the slit is worked by a spring, and by pressing a small knob the slide is put to one side, and when the ballot is deposited it goes back to its place. The key hole is covered by a strap, and that again is secured by a padlock which fastens at the side. A seal on the strap completes the closing of the box. It will thus be seen that every provision is made to en. sure security, and ballot stuffing is impossible if the agents of the can. didates don't wilfully shut their eyes when the voting is going on. When the box has been properly locked and secured it is handed to the Returning Officer, and is not opened till the voting is concluded, when the ballot papers aré taken out and the returns made up.

Only one elector is admitted at a is recorded a ballot paper and an envelope are handed to him. While he is making out his ballot paper, another voter may be admitted to have his name recorded, so as to lose no time. When the elector makes out his ballot paper he hands it to the deputy returning officer who drops it into the box, and the elector passes out by another door. By good management fifty votes may easily be recorded an hour, or four hundred in the time allowed for voting, from 9 a.m. till 5 p.m. The new system presents a marked contrast to the old one in the total absence of noise or disturbance at the polling place. There is nowrangling, no coaxing, no coercion. The elector quietly walks out again. The new law does not allow the agents of candidates to make known to their friends outside the n.m.es of the electors who have or who have not voted, but this can easily be ascertained by checking the rames on the lists as they pass in to vote. Parties bringing up voters can therefore be kept posted, and everyone who requires looking after can be attended to.

France Appeals to England.—The Neue Free Press of Vienna reports that the Duke de Cazes, French Minister Foreign of Affairs, has complained to the British Government that Germany is seeking a quarrel with France. The complaint is based on conversation of July 30th, between the Duke and Prince Hohenlohe, the German Ambassador at Paris, when the latter stated that Germany, irrespective of the action of other powers, would take what steps it thought proper against the discriminations made by the French in favor of the Carlists, in violation of the obligations of neutrality.

The Hon. Charles Laberge, a prominent member of the Roage Party, died of consumption on Thursday, at his residence in Montreal. Deceased was born in Montreal in 1827, and entered upon a highly successful course at St. Hyacunthe, in 1837. He was admitted to the bar in 1848, and entered Parliament for Iberville in 1853, became Solicitor General for Lower Canada under the Brown Dorion administration in 1858, and represented Iberville until 1862. In 1863 he was appointed Assistant Judge for Sorel District, holding the position for one year. He was connected at an early age with a Lotbiniere newspaper of very pronounced Liberal opinions; subsequently with the Pays, a similar journal, but of a modified type; and on the establishment of Le National was appointed editor in chief.
