CARELESS MORTGAGE INVOLVES LOSS OF REAL PROPERTY

Judge Winter Gives Judgment In Interesting Case Finding For the Plaintiff

Judge Winter yesterday gave judgment for the plaintiff in the case of B. Simon against Thomas Ross.

When Simon entered into possession of the property it was seized by a bailiff on behalf of the defendant whose mortgage was not filed in accordance with the statute.

J. J. McDonald appeared for the plaintiff, and C. M. Wright for the defendant. The judgment is as follows:

"The chattel mortgage as filed with the clerk of the court purports to be made by Joseph Fleury, hereinafter called the mortgagor of the first part, and the defendant, hereinafter called the mortgagee of the second part.

"The mortgage was executed in duplicate, the originals being handed back to the mortgagor's solicitor, marked by the clerk, and is made between Joseph Fleury and Marion Mason as mortgagors. It is attested by the same witnesses, who in the affidavit of execution repeats the mistake in both of Fleury's names.

"The mortgaged property appeared to have belonged to Fleury and Marion Mason. Fleury absconded and Mason seems to have obtained possession of the property, and subsequently sold it to the plaintiff who was in possession when it was seized by the defendant's sheriff under the chattel mortgage.

"Careless Preparation.—The chattel mortgage was not carefully drawn and the affidavit of execution was carelessly prepared. As a result of this want of care Marion Mason's name was not entered in the index of names and mortgages which the ordinance prescribes shall be kept, so that the public would have no notice whatever that Marion Mason had mortgaged any property. As a fact, her name does not appear in any way in the index.

"In this case, the part of the chattel mortgage filed and the duplicate cannot be accepted for the purposes of registration as one document. Moreover, in each instance the affidavit of execution is defective in that it does not truly state the right names of the mortgagors, and on this ground I hold the registration of the mortgage to be irregular and that it cannot be held good against the plaintiff, who was a purchaser in good faith and without notice of this chattel mortgage.

"Judgment will be for the plaintiff in the terms of the charge, the damages being fixed at \$30.00 for the seizure. The costs to be on the D. C. scale in cases above \$100.00."

Lethbridge Butter Tops Market. Lethbridge, June 5.—The Lethbridge creamery, after two months' operation, is doing an enormous business, and the shippers are increasing at a rate that warrants the assertion that the market is doing better than during the profitable. The company has brought on a superintendent from Minneapolis, and the butter is also an experienced man, and as a result there is a greater demand for the products than there is supply.

BIG CLAIM IS LAID AGAINST RAILWAY FOR LAND VALUE

Appeal Heard Against Award of Arbitrators in Expropriation of Gravel Pits

Long argument is being held before the supreme court on appeal from the award of the arbitrators in the case of the gravel pits at Blackfalds on the Calgary and Edmonton railway.

The land was originally held by the Saskatchewan Land and Homestead company and the railway took proceedings to expropriate, and to which an objection was laid by the land company. An arbitration as to the value of the land was made in 1912, the expropriation having been started in 1908.

It is against this award that the appeal is now made. The counsel for the appellants yesterday afternoon stated that the more the value of the land at the time should be considered but the potential value which would arise from the gravel, sand or other deposits. Recent decisions from Montreal and Toronto, where such potential value was recognized, were quoted in favor of the appellants.

It is understood that the claim of the appellants is supported by the Trust and Guarantee company as having a mortgage on the land for some \$300,000 which is vastly in advance of what was allowed by the arbitrators.

Frank Ford, G. C., and A. R. Cunningham appear for the appellants and O. M. Biggar, K.C., and G. A. Walker appear for the Calgary and Edmonton railway.

WOOL CLIP OF SOUTH WILL APPROXIMATE 825,000 POUNDS

C. P. R. Will Stand 25 Per Cent. of Freight Charges to Help the Industry

Lethbridge, June 5.—The wool clip of Southern Alberta this year will probably exceed \$25,000,000, a record breaker in this line, and a pointer to the great quantities that will in future be shipped out of this section of the province.

Most of the shearing will be done this month, commencing today, and the wool growers have commencing to erect a shearing plant on the new Lethbridge-Weyburn line near Chin Coulee, where 50,000 or more sheep will be shorn.
