HARVESTER COMPANY BORROWED MANY MILLIONS

Perkins Says Company Used \$140,000,000 in Its European Operations

Chicago, June 20.—When George W. Perkins, former partner of the late J. P. Morgan, took the witness stand for the defense in the International Harvester company anti-trust hearing yesterday, he was warned by Attorney Grosvenor, representing the government, that the conditions under which he testified did not give him immunity from possible prosecution.

"You have been subpoenaed by Edgar A. Hanratt, of the International Harvester company," said Attorney Grosvenor. "Both are defendants in this suit. Out of 1,200 witnesses you are the first to be subpoenaed. In view of this state of affairs, I wish to inform you that your testimony here does not give you immunity from prosecution."

"In reply I will say I was very much surprised," said Perkins. "I was not subpoenaed by the government of its own volition."

PRESIDENT HAS BEEN GIVEN WIDE POWERS IN TARIFF BILL

Washington, June 20.—An amendment to the Underwood tariff bill adopted yesterday by the majority members of the senate finance committee would give the president of the United States authority to spend certain rates in the proposed law and to proclaim special rates against nations which discriminate against products of the United States.

The amendment is appended to the clause giving the president authority to negotiate reciprocity amendments with foreign nations and in some respects resembles the minimum and maximum clause of the Payne-Aldrich tariff law, eliminated in the House bill. In substance, the amendment would provide that when any nation discriminates against the products of the United States or imposes restrictions against United States exports or does not, in the opinion of the president, reciprocate in trade relations, the president may, by proclamation, suspend certain rates and put in effect other rates.

After re-opening consideration of the bill, the committee now has disposed of the schedule and administrative features of the bill and tomorrow will turn them over to the caucus. It worked until a late hour tonight on the income tax, which will be reported to the caucus as soon as possible.

The Democratic senatorial caucus began work on the bill today.

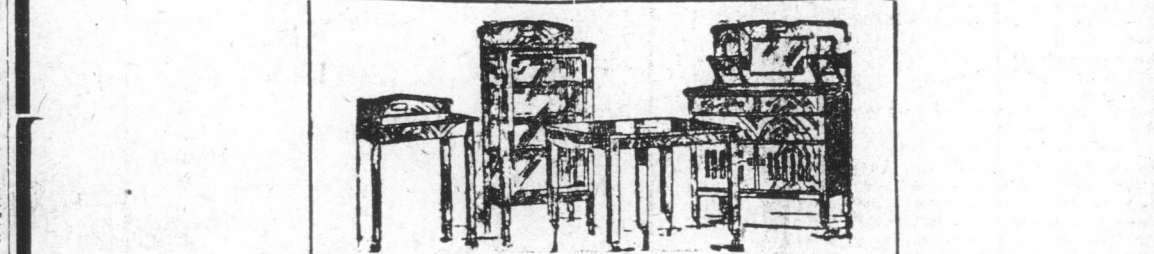
