The Danish laws require Government inspectors of all butter factories, who can, at any time, enter dairies, factories or warehouses and rake away samples for analysis. Should oleomargarine or any other adulterant be found, the maker is fined \$27\$. The result is really first-class butter of uniform character, due to this Government supervision and the careful treatment of the milk till it can be made into butter. A retail dealer in anypart of England who orders 50 tubs of Danish butter knows exactly what he will get. It must be the same with Canadian butter if we are to have the trade.

ONTARIO AT THE WORLD'S FAIR Granted Largely-Increased Space for Live Stock, Horses, Dogs, Poultry, Etc.

As a result of the visit of Mr. Nicholas Awrey, M. P.P., commissioner for Ontario for the World's Fair, to Chicago, largely increased space has been secured for this Province. Mr. Buchanan, chief of the agricultural department, agreed that Ontario should have space for 125 horses, 150 head of cattle, 300 sheep, 100 hogs and 200 coups of poultry, thus enabling the premier Province of Canada to make a representative exhibit. Stockmen will be pleased to learn that live stock will not be required to remain on the ground for three months as at first announced, but only for the following terms: Cattle from Aug. 21 to Sept. 21; sheep and swine, Sept. 25 to Oct. 14; poultry, Oct. 16 to 28; fat stock, Oct. 16 to 28. Ages of stock will be computed on the following dates: Cattle, Sept. 11; sheep, Oct. 21; swine, Oct. 2; fat stock, Oct. 16. It has been decided that entries will be taken in cattle as late as June 13; sheep as late as July 1; and poultry July 13. Room will be allowed for 200 dogs, and entries in this class will be received up to May 20. The entries in live stock, etc., now pouring in on Commissioner Awrey at Toronto, indicate that the applications will exceed the space allotted many times over. Hon. Wallaceburg, June 4.—The heavy rains of the last two days in this section have caused a tremendous rise in the Sydenham. Both branches have risen above high water mark and are still rising. Large juns of logs have been brought down, and one jam is now blocked against the main bridge here, and there is great danger of its being carried away. About 10,000,000 feet of logs are in the jam. Mill owners and lumbermen are heavy losers, as thousands of logs have gone out towards Lake St. Clair, and their recovery will incur heavy expense. Navigation is blocked at present. Should the log jams hold until the water recedes it will take several weeks to clear the rivers.

SMALLPOX STOPS TRADE.

The Dread Disease Raging in Part of the Ohio Valley.

The Dread Disease Raging in the Ohio Valley.

PITTSBURG, Pa., June 5.—Smallpox is raging in the Ohio Valley, between the Big and Little Kanawaha rivers. Pomeroy, Ohio, Mason City, Letart and other West Virginia towns are quarantined, and nearly every town in the valley has taken stringent measures to prevent the spread of the scourge. The Ohio River Railroad, the boats, and all business in that part of the country are suffering greatly, as no shipments can be made to or from the infected district. At Parkersburg, W. Va., goods are accumulating, and all business is practically at a standstill. The sixth smallpox case of the season was yesterday taken to the hospital in Pittsburg. Some alarm is felt, especially as it is the third case from the thickly populated neighborhood of Denny's court, near Thirtieth street and Pennsylvania avenue. Pennsylvania avenue.
