THE JAPS WIN AGAIN.

Chinese Thrashed and a City Captured

by the Victors-Quick Work. YOKOHAMA, Nov. 5 .- A dispatch from the front show that there has been heavy fighting in the country just north of Port Arthur. It appears that Field Marshal Oyama divided his forces. While one division landed on the east coast of the peninsula north of Talien Wan, another division was detached with orders to effect a landing near Kinchow and to proceed thence and join the main body of the army. This plan was a complete success. The Japanese encountered no Chinese warships, and the transports reached

Kayenko and disembarked the troops, guns, horses and munitions in safety. Hinchow, which is a walled town and which was believed to be held by large garrison, was immediately attacked. The outer defenses were carried by the Japanese after a few hour's fighting. The Chinese made little further resistance and the Japanese were soon masters of the situation. In the meantime the Japanese fleet, which had convoyed the transports, opened a heavy fire on Talien Wan and Kayenko. The firing scarcely ceased for many hours. Aided by the fleet, the troops attacked Talien Wan and carried it in brilliant fashion.
