small depression moving east across
Michigan, causing overcast to rainy
weather, with high winds in the lake
region. The weather is showery in the

A FATAL FEAT

By a St. Catharines Man—The Strain Was

Too Much For Him.

St. Catharines, May 14.—Mr. Walter
T. Duncan, brother-in-law of Mr. J. A.
Robertson, of the Globe Hotel, Queens-
ton station, dropped dead shortly before
noon yesterday in the yard of the hotel.
He and eight or ten others around the
hotel were out in the yard yesterday
morning throwing a heavy stone, jump-
ing etc., and then several of these pres-
ent began stooping over, touching the
ground at their toes without bending
their legs. Duncan put the palms of his
hands on the ground in this way, and
after some of the others had done the
same, Mr. Duncan stood on a stone
about three inches high and again
touched the ground. He then straight-
ened up and went over to meet a horse
that had just come in, and when he
reached the horse's head he fell to the
ground. Mr. George Robertson called
to his brother James, and they carried
him into the house, but he never spoke,
and was dead almost instantly.
