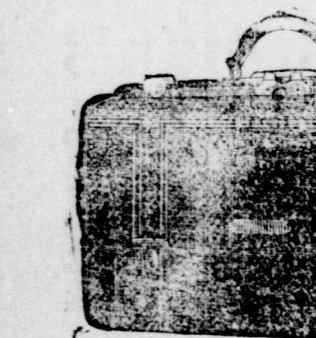

KNOCKED OUT BY HAILSTONES.
Cincinnati, April 23.—Miss Lenore Smith, a student at Mount Union College, while on her way home, was caught in the recent storm. She was struck on the head by the large hailstones, knocked down, and was unconscious for three hours. She has been ill ever since with concussion of the brain.

FOUND A WOMAN'S HEAD.

Buffalo, April 23.—John Hoag, a farmer near Orchard Park, procured a load of manure in this city, and took it to his farm. In spreading it on the land, he uncovered the head of a woman. The head was wrapped in a Buffalo newspaper, and there is a bullet hole in the occipital region. Hoag is unable to tell where he got the head, as he has been hauling manure from several livery stables. The police are trying to locate the body from which the head was severed.

HANGED HIM TO SAVE HIS LIFE.

Cincinnati, Ohio, April 23.—Wm. Penn, an Indian living at Elmwood Place, was seriously injured about the spine on Jan. 2 by being buried under several tons of ice at Chester Lake ice house in St. Bernard. Since that time Penn has been unable to move, and his physicians decided to adopt heroic measures. The other evening he was hung by the neck and left in that position for several hours until his spine had again assumed its normal position. A strap was placed under his shoulders to avoid strangulation. He was able to walk about next morning.

—Mr. C. Eggett, of Lorne Avenue, wishes it understood that he is not the Mr. Eggett connected in the Emma Trueman case.

—The executive of the Young Liberal Club will meet for the transaction of most important business tonight, Wednesday, at 8 o'clock sharp.

—The eighth annual convention of the Baptists of Ontario and Quebec will be held in the Olivet Baptist Church, Montreal, May 26 to June 2.

—The Berlin Daily News says: Mr. T. L. Belcher, the well-known London, Ont., commercial traveler, conducted a prayer meeting for men at the Y. M. C. A., Thursday night. He is a genial, whole-souled gentleman, and makes friends wherever he goes. His meeting was largely attended.

—The regular weekly meeting of the water commissioners was held in the City Hall yesterday afternoon. Commissioners Judd (chairman) and Cowan, the secretary, Mr. P. Walsh, Engineer Moore and Inspector Plawton being present. Engineer Moore gave notice that the loss by the fire at the waterworks on York Street, estimated at \$352 on building and \$350 on stock. The chairman added that he had signed the claim paper and received a check for the insurance of the stock and that the company carrying the policy was prepared to give the commissioners a check for the amount of damage to the building. Mr. P. Walsh, 110 Dundas Street, informed the board that he was willing to dispose of the Redmond Ponds, and would agree to the commissioners' making the purchase either with or without first testing the quality of the water. The matter was laid over for further consideration. The board granted a request from Mr. V. Cronyn, to have a meter placed in his residence on Dundas Street. On the recommendation of the engineer, it was also decided to lay a main for four new cottages on Nightingale Avenue, owned by Mr. A. Krenleyside, provided Mr. Krenleyside was guaranteed the constant use of water in the places. The main will cost \$250.

MUST SPARE THE REDBREASTS.

The Game Warden intends to open a campaign against the small boys and others who shoot robins and blue birds with catapults. The law is specific in protecting insectivorous birds, and almost all the common flyers except sparrows and crows come under that definition. The small boy must therefore confine his attentions to the latter birds and let robins and blue birds alone.

THEATRICAL SCANDAL.

Thomas Seabrooke, the Well Known Comedian, Sued for Alimony—Cruelty Alleged.

New York, April 23.—Thomas Q. Seabrooke, of comic opera fame, who is now appearing in "The Speculator" at the Fifth Avenue Theater, was yesterday served with a notice that on Thursday his wife will apply to Justice Smyth in the Supreme Court for alimony and counsel fee, pending her action for separation, on the ground of cruelty and abandonment. Mrs. Seabrooke is an actress. She was a footlight favorite when she and Seabrooke were married, July 24, 1883. She went under the stage name of Elvira Crox. Mrs. Seabrooke alleges that her husband beat her several times. On one of these occasions, she says, he tore her dress from her body. Intoxication is also alleged in the wife's affidavit.

Mrs. Seabrooke does not intend to get an absolute divorce, which would give him a chance to marry her rival. That is why she has merely begun action for separation. Mr. Hummel informs that she alimony shall be ample, if he can urge it on the counts, as Seabrooke's income is from \$10,000 to \$20,000 a year. He was recently offered \$300 a week by A. M. Palmer.

EXODUS FROM QUEBEC.

Many French Canadians Going to New England This Season to Look for Work.

Quebec, April 23.—A great many French-Canadians are leaving the Province of Quebec for New England this spring. On the last train that passed safely over the iron bridge at St. Anselme, three minutes before it was carried away by the ice, were 148 Canadians going to the States in search of work. It is probable that the Grand Trunk, the Canadian Pacific, and their connections carry as many as the Quebec Central. This exodus has been going on for the last month and will probably continue for some time. Over 60 operatives from the city of Quebec left here one day last week for New Hampshire. Most of the emigrants, however, are from country parishes below Quebec along the Intercolonial Railway. They want work as factory operatives, brick-makers, and farm hands.

It used to be said that many of the emigrants returned here at the end of the summer season, but this is now known to be incorrect in most cases, as the number of deserted farms in Quebec Province testifies.
