Tax Exemptions.

Property Which Escapes Taxation at the Present Time.

Convention of Muncipal Representa tives to Consider the Whole Question.

Toronto Globe. A convention of the municipal representatives will meet in Toronto, Sept. 9 and 10, to discuss the troublesome of exemptions under the laws of Ontario, which follows, is a formidable one, and will give the convention ample

food for discussion: All property vested in or held by her Majesty, or vested in any public body or body corporate, officer or person in trust for her Majesty, or for the public uses of the province and also all property vested in or held by her Majesty, or any other person of body corporate, in trust for or for the of any tribe or body of Indians, and either unoccupied or occupied by ome person in an official capacity. Where any property mentioned in the preceding clause is occupied by any

person otherwise than in an official capacity, the occupant shall be assessed in respect thereof, but the property it-self shall not be liable. Every place of worship, and land used n connection therewith, churchyard or ourying ground. Provided, however,

that land on which a place of worship is erected, and land used in connec tion with a place of worship, shall be liable to be assessed in the same way and to the same extent as other land. r to be made.

The buildings and grounds of and attached to every university, college, high school or other incorporated seminary of learning, whether vested in a trustee or otherwise, so long as such buildings and grounds are actually used and occupied by such institution, or if unoccupied, but not if otherwise occupied. 
