AWFUL ACCIDENT!

Twenty-Seven Men Killed in a Colorado Mine,

Caused by a "Pust Explosion"-Only Eleven of the Number Recognizable.

DENVER, Col., Jan. 11.—Particulars of one of the worst mining accidents in this State have been received here. The Union Pacific Railway own and operate coal mines at King, four miles from Como, where they employed 200 miners. Yesterday afternoon a premature explosion occurred in one of the chambers where 28 miners were at work. A terrific explosion occurred—or, as the miners call it, a "dust explosion." The shock killed 27 of the men, only one escaping, he being nearly at the entrance.
