BRANT.

County Crown Attorney Van Norman, who was stricken down with paralysis last Saturday, has very much improved. Workmen have commenced to tear down the old drill shed in Alexandria Park, Brantford. The new hall will be up this summer.

The customs collected in Brantford during February totaled \$11,974 24, an increase of \$2,346 17. Inland revenue, \$5,364.

ELGIN.

KENT.

On Wednesday the grocery and dwelling occupied by W. Smith and family, Wallaceburg, was totally destroyed by fire. The family were asleep at the time and had only time to pull out some of their belongings. The place was all in flames. The entire grocery stock which was in the front part was destroyed. The stable at the rear of the building was burned, but most of the contents were saved.

The Watford Board of Health and local physicians report the town entirely free from contagious diseases of any kind.

The liabilities of G. F. Lanktry, tailor, Alvinton, Ont., are about \$450 and the assets \$250.

At a special meeting of the Watford Council the fee for hotel licenses in the corporation was fixed at \$120, which, with the Government tax of the same amount, increases the license to \$240—\$70 higher than last year. Shop licenses were placed at \$200.

Gunn Bros., of the Stratford canning factory, lately shipped \$10,000 worth of canned goods. They are now unloading several thousand cans for the trade of the coming season, which they expect will largely exceed that of last year.

The Stratford collector has finished his work and returned the roll, which shows the state of things to be more satisfactory than for quite a number of years. The total amount of taxes on the roll is \$18,987 35, of which \$18,720 were collected. \$163 27 returned as non-resident, a small amount dealt with by the council, and \$34 75 no goods to distill.

The annual census meeting at Avon came off on Saturday. Felix O'Leary, Esq., was the president, took the chair. The auditor's account was next read and accepted as follows: Number pounds milk, 2,462,803; number pounds cheese, 262,289; total amount money, \$24,984 90; paid Mr. Morris, manufacturer, \$2,023 49; incidental expenses, \$133. The election of officers for the ensuing year resulted as follows: Directors, Messrs. M. Smith, G. Teskey, J. Stewart, H. Deane and M. Clement. Mr. Uglow was chosen as auditor.

Robert Wilson, who died at his residence in Delaware township, on March 1, was born at Market Weighton, Yorkshire, England, in 1808, and emigrated to America in 1834. He carried on an extensive business in Indiana, near Chicago, until 1855, when he retired and settled in Canada in the northern part of the township of Delaware. In that picturesque part of the country, somewhat resembling his own native land, he lived, surrounded by his family, interesting himself in the life of his farm and enjoying his intense love of literature. He was especially well acquainted with the works of the poets, and was himself possessed of considerable poetic talent. Deceased was a brother-in-law of the late William Hampshire Perkins, of England. He leaves a widow and two daughters. Mr. Henry Mathewson, of the Free Press. Two brothers and two sisters survive him—Thomas Wilson, of Milan, Michigan; Charles Wilson, of Iowa; Miss Maria Wilson and Mrs. Harriet Perkins, of England. He leaves a widow and two daughters. Mrs. Robert, Kilbourne and Mrs. Charles McGregor—to mourn the loss of a tender husband and an affectionate parent. Among his last words to his sorrowing family was the exclamation "How brightly breaks the morning." A man of pure morality and a firm believer in the glorious truths of Christianity, he passed peacefully away, fully resigned to the will of God and implicitly trusting in his grace.

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THE OPEN FORUM.

The Settlement of Eastern Algoma.

To the Editor of the ADVERTISER:

Our attention has just been called to a letter which appears in the Daily Empire of the 16th inst., entitled "The Settlement of Eastern Algoma," signed "Verax," and dated from Sault Ste. Marie. While, as a rule, we think it not worth while to pay much attention to a letter written anonymously and bearing no signature, yet as the letter mentioned throws discredit on an organization and body of men composed of some of the best citizens of the district of Eastern Algoma, and of men who have worked hard and faithfully during the last two years in endeavoring to promote the interests of this great district in every way possible, we think it right at once publicly to refute the slanders contained in the said letter.

During the last few months public colonization and immigration meetings have been held at different leading points all along the north shore, between and inclusive of the Goulais Bay settlement and the Iron Bridge settlement, and on the islands of Manitoulin and St. Joseph. These meetings have not only been addressed by the directors of the Algoma Land and Colonization Company, but by the leading citizens all over the district. At each of these meetings, which have been largely attended by the settlers and residents having neighborhoods in which the meetings have been held, resolutions have been passed endorsing the aims, plans, purposes and methods of the said company; and at each of these meetings strong resolutions have been passed urging upon both the Dominion Government and the Dominion Land and Colonization Company, by liberal grants and subsidies. The following resolution was passed at a mass meeting of the settlers, millers, merchants and residents of St. Joseph's Island and the township of St. Joseph, held at the town hall at Marksville, on the 10th day of June, 1892. "That seeing that the great District of Algoma contains an area larger than any of the Provinces of Canada, or of any of the States of the Union (except Texas), and that it contains as fine agricultural and stock-raising lands as the sun shines on anywhere, besides almost limitless and inexhaustible mineral and timber resources, and seeing that Algoma is in the center of Canada and is easily and cheaply reached, and that it is the nearest and most convenient field for immigration and colonization in the world today, and that within the confines of the district of Algoma may be found room for the surplus population, not only of older Canada but of Europe, and seeing that the Dominion Government has organized the Algoma Land and Colonization Company (Limited), and that the said company has published all over the world many and great advantages and inducements Algoma offers as a field of immigration and stock settlement on the agricultural and stock-raising lands, millers and residents of St. Joseph's Island and the townships of the mainland opposite the same do hereby urge upon the Governments, both of the Dominion of Canada and of the Province of Ontario, the immediate necessity of granting liberal aid and subsidies to the said colonization company and to aid it in every way possible in carrying out its object to settle Algoma, and to urge the Parliamentary representatives of Algoma to do all in their power to have such liberal aid and subsidies granted to the said company."

Similar resolutions were passed at mass meetings held all over the district—Tessalon, Goulais Bay, Iron Bridge, Gore Bay and other places. Every grand jury which has sat in the county of Algoma, whether at Sault Ste. Marie or Gore Bay, whether at the sessions or the sessions, within the last eighteen months, have brought in presentments worded almost in the same way or containing similar statements of the above resolution. Every grand jury, representative body of the people of the district, including town councils, municipal councils, boards of trade, farmers' institutes, the Eastern Algoma Electoral Division Agricultural Society and each of the township and local agricultural societies, have signed a petition to both the Dominion Government and the Dominion Land and Colonization Company, and the Dominion Government containing the recitals set out in full in pages 4 to 8 (inclusive) in the pamphlet "Algoma Farmers' Institute," recently issued by the said company. The public and representative bodies of the said public and representative bodies are as follows: "That your Government may at once grant liberal aid and liberal subsidies to the said Algoma Land and Colonization Company (Limited), and continue the same yearly so as to enable the said company to carry out its large printing, lithographing and other expenses. That your Government may also grant them sufficient aid to enable them to print and circulate the said pamphlet, and to enable them to French, German and Scandinavian editions of their series of "The New Northwest," and that in other ways and in every way possible your Government aid and assist the said company in the speedy effecting of their object to settle Algoma."

Similar resolutions were also passed at the annual meeting of the Central Algoma Farmers' Institute, held at the town of Sault Ste. Marie last June, and at the annual meeting of the Eastern Algoma Farmers' Institute, held at the town of Tessalon last July. The originals of these grand jury presentments, resolutions and petitions are on file with the Governments at Toronto and Ottawa.

Owing to the agitation thus raised by the labors of the "Colonization and Immigration movement in Algoma" has been aroused in the leading newspapers of older Canada and Great Britain, and Algoma is held in high esteem and is being brought into prominence as a field of immigration and stock settlement.

Amongst other good things arising out of this agitation was the sending to Algoma last fall of a special correspondent of the Globe. This gentleman attended the fair exhibitions, not only of the District Agricultural Society, at Sault Ste. Marie, but of the various branch agricultural societies throughout the district and on his return to Toronto, he wrote and published in the Globe a series of letters, giving an account of what he saw in the district.
