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**ADJUSTED FATAL NOOSE**

**AND JUMPED FROM BEAM**

**Fred Joyce, of Byron, Dies Alone  
in His Barn.**

**Had Given No Evidence of Insanity  
or Despondency.**

Frederick Joyce, a 66-year-old bach-  
elor, who has resided in Byron for  
many years, was found hanging dead  
in his barn at an early hour this morn-  
ing, and all the surrounding circum-  
stances indicate that the case was one  
of suicide.

Joyce lived alone in a small house in  
Byron Village, and made his living  
principally by raising a few hogs and  
doing a little dealing in them. The  
barn on his premises was partly used  
by George Sumner, a fireman at the  
waterworks pumping-house. Sumner  
went to the barn at about a quarter  
to 6 this morning, and on opening the  
door that led to see Joyce's body  
hanging in front of him, suspended  
by a rope from a beam of the barn.

Joyce had evidently climbed up the  
ladder to the beam, attached the rope  
to it close to the ladder, and jumped  
off. Death was apparently instantan-  
eous and painless, as the body and  
features were both composed, and gave  
no evidence of struggle. The body  
hung close to the ladder that it  
almost touched it.

Summer hastily cut the body down  
and ran for assistance, but it was  
found that life was quite extinct, and  
the body cold, showing that Joyce's  
rash act had been committed some  
hours previous to the finding of the  
body.

No cause for Joyce's deed has yet  
been assigned. While not in overly  
prosperous circumstances, he had  
shown no evidences of despondency or  
mental unsoundness. He leaves two  
brothers in Kilworth, Ed and Cyrus  
Joyce. It is understood he left a will  
disposing of his small property. Joyce  
was well known in Westminster  
Township.

On being informed of Joyce's death  
Coroner Fergusson dispatched County  
Constable Ward to the scene to make  
an investigation. On receiving the  
constable's report, Coroner Fergusson  
decided that the case was clearly one  
of suicide
