Birds" Who Are Able to Do a Good Day's Work Are Few in Number.

The jail population is seriously lacking in workers these days. In other words, the number of able-bodied prisoners who are, by the nature of their oftenses liable for manual labor, is pelow the average.

Women, old men, insane persons, those on remand, or in other words, grand rows of maples, beautiful lawns, those who, although convicted are to serve out their sentences in the Toro 1to or Kingston institutions, cannot be called upon to saw wood, break stones, cut grass, wash floors, and so on. Most of the work around the county buildings is therefore done by those who have only committed minor offenses, and are in for short terms, physical capabilities, of course, being given duc onsideration. And it happens that just at present

there are very few jul 'parters who fulfill all the conditions necessary to their being open for hard labor. Yesterday Provincial Bail: English removed the following four stal varis to the Central Prison: Walter Brenner, Jim Barrett, H. Donneley and Ai Smith. These are now putting in ten hours per day at the style of labor for which the Central is noted. The Central is always crowded, while there is generally lots of room to spare in the various county jails.
