

TERRORISTS NOW USING POISON

More Subtle Methods of Battering with Government.

CHILDREN JOIN REVOLUTIONISTS

Here Boys Take to Bomb-Throwing—Police Rounding Up Many of the Plotters.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 17.—An important arrest of six social revolutionists, lavishly provided with explosives and bombs, who, it is believed, were planning an attempt on the life of Governor-General Dvornikov, of Moscow, was made here yesterday evening, just previous to their departure for Moscow. A seventh member of the party, a student, threw away a bomb and escaped.

The police also took into custody eight terrorists belonging to another group, at whose residence was found cyanide of potassium and other deadly chemicals, sufficient, it is said, to kill half the population of St. Petersburg, and thousands of revolutionary proclamations.

It is suspected that the terrorists, failing to reach prominent persons here by open violence, are about to try the more subtle means of poison.

The police here have been advised of the arrest at Saratoff of the members of a social revolutionary committee instituted to incite agrarian troubles in the Province of Saratoff. Among those arrested are many students. One of the latter was found to have a poisoned dagger in his possession.

The Official Messenger prints the weekly summary of violent political crimes and seizures of bombs, explosives and weapons. The record consists mainly of a long enumeration of cities where the terrorists have been active. These include St. Petersburg, Moscow, Odessa, Kiev, Nizhni Novgorod, Vilna, Warsaw, Samara, Krasnodar, Sebastopol, Kazan, Tiflis, Riga and other principal cities, where officials have been killed, patriots fired on, bombs, weapons and dynamite seized, or postoffices, banks or other state institutions attacked. A number of the crimes were committed by mere boys.

Dispatches tell of a grammar school wounding a reactionary teacher at Kharkoff and the arrest at Bard-leff of a 15-year-old lad having three loaded bombs in his possession.

There is evidence that a bomb explosion, which occurred at Vilna on Feb. 14 was part of a general plot with ramifications throughout the empire, aimed at preventing the participation of the moderate parties in the election, and the chief of the secret police here has sent order to the governments of all the cities to do everything possible to guard against similar attempts. Details of the explosion show that six local revolutionists were on their way to blow up a club house where moderates were in session, when one of the former slipped on the icy sidewalk and exploded a bomb.

ASKS \$30,000 FEE

Montreal Lawyer's Big Bill for Settling Celebrated Case.

Montreal, Feb. 18.—Thirty thousand dollars for legal services is the modest fee demanded by C. M. Holt, K. C., for services rendered Mrs. Wright in her action against the James Cooper estate to recover money and 400 shares of Dominion Bridge Company stock. Among the charges is an item of \$1,000 for a trip to Sydney, C. B., to obtain Mrs. Stevens' signature to certain deeds; another charge of \$1,250 in the original bill for going to New York to secure evidence was cut down to \$100 in the amended bill. Mr. Holt stated in court that he simply cut down the bill because he thought some of the items might be reduced or cut out. The case is attracting very wide attention in the Montreal bar, of which Mr. Holt is a leading member, while the litigation in which the bill was incurred was a cause celebre here.

Consular Agents Forbidden to Board Steamers Without Permission.

Caracas, Venezuela, Thursday, Feb. 15, via Willemstad, Feb. 15.—The preparations for war at the Venezuelan ports have been completed. A large quantity of ammunition arrived in Venezuela last week.

All the foreign consuls, consular agents and other foreign officials have been absolutely forbidden to go on board steamers at Venezuelan ports without first obtaining official permission.

The Venezuelan Government has appointed Guzman Garbira to be minister to the United States in place of M. Velez-Gutierrez, who offended President Castro by voting to hold the Pan-American Congress at Rio Janeiro.

HEDGED ABOUT BY RIGID RULES

Ridiculous Etiquette Ahead for Princess Ena.

WHICH GOVERNS SPANISH COURT

Alonso and His Bride Will Be Treated Much as Children in a Nursery.

Paris, Feb. 19.—Poor Princess Ena! Whether she loves her fiancé or not she is to be a slave of the most rigid and ridiculous etiquette in existence at any court, and many will surely be the days when she will long for the free and easy life to which she has been used from her childhood.

From the moment when King Alfonso places the crown upon her head she can no longer call her very soul her own. Rules have been laid down for every act of the Queen of Spain from breathing to sleeping.

Whether she likes or not she must go to bed at 10 in the summer and at 8:30 in the winter. Should the king wish to visit her apartment after dark he must ring himself out like a professional burglar.

He must wear soft felt slippers over his shoes, have a black mantle thrown over his shoulder and in one hand he must carry a shield in the other a naked sword, and he must go unaccompanied.

To make his appearance more burglarlike he must also carry a lantern. When he retires to his own bedroom he has to submit to being looked up by the guard stationed outside his door who turns the key over to the grand master of the palace, who unlocks the door in the morning.

King Alfonso hates all these ceremonies, and formerly often tried to have some of the most irksome ones abolished, but he might as well have tried to run down the wall of a fortress and has now given up resistance.

Apologies of etiquette our own chief executive has to submit to many rules which are as odious as they are useless, and there has not been one president who has not in vain tried to have them abolished. President Loubet only a few days ago said that he felt like a prisoner to be set free after having served a seven-year sentence, and Mme. Loubet is none the less happy at the idea that from tomorrow she is once more allowed to be her own mistress.

The etiquette of the Palais Elisee is abominable and almost unbearable and besides there is always the terrible anxiety the fear of assassins which gnaws at your heart while your face must appear smiling and unconcerned.

Bosses Swear at Mexicans, Who Have High-Explosive Jags.

It is a vice that is rapidly spreading to all the mining camps in Mexico. Users of dynamite soon learn that it is a powerful stimulant, and that the effects of intoxication are pleasing, while they last, beyond the most excruciating fantasies of an opium dream.

The "dynamiteur" usually is very dainty and exact in his method of going about the introduction of a high explosive into his system. The preferred way to do this is to cut off a small piece of 55 cent "dynamite," about the size of a pea. This is dissolved in a small glass. It is said that very soon his nerves begin to tingle, and stranger dreams come to him than the weird visions induced by hashish.

CHINA'S RULER GIFTED, GENTLE

Artist, Paints Portrait and Studies Character.

THINKS HER GREAT WOMAN

Characterizes Her Reign, Says Correspondent, as a Marvel of Astuteness.

New York, Feb. 18.—Mr. Hubert Vos, the famous Dutch artist, who is well-known in Chicago and Washington, and has done a great deal of portrait work in both cities, has just returned from a six months' visit to China, where he was called to paint the Emperor and the Empress Dowager. The emperor has learned that pictures last longer than monuments, and, to perpetuate her memory, ordered two portraits, one representing her as she appeared when she was 30 years of age and first assumed imperial authority, and the other being an accurate likeness of her at her present age, which is nearly 71. She had already been three times painted by Miss Carl, an American artist, who had been recommended by Mrs. Conger, wife of the recent American minister to Peking, but the pictures were not satisfactory, and hence Mr. Vos, who spent a winter at the Chinese capital some years ago, and had painted several of the princesses of the court, was sent for and given the commission. The emperor finally decided not to have his picture painted. Although he was repeatedly urged to do so by his imperial aunt and other members of the family, and also by his ministers, he persistently refused to sit. The empress, however, gave Mr. Vos her own sitting at the palace in Peking and at the summer palace, twelve or fifteen miles outside the city.

Mr. Vos says that she is herself a gifted artist and has remarkably good taste. She selected her costume and her pose, and designed the background of her pictures. One of the portraits, is very large. It represents her imperial majesty at the age of 30, seated upon the throne, surrounded by symbols of power and emblems of her dynasty, which the Chinese call "chings imperial." In the background is a glimpse of the imperial park—a lake and a bamboo grove, and on each side of the throne is a large vase, which she selected from her collection. She appears in the head-dress, which is made of false hair, shaped like an open bow, about eighteen inches wide, and ornamented with pearls and other precious stones and jade ornaments of different colors. Her robe is of imperial yellow silk. (Mr. Vos says she never wears anything but yellow and blue), and interwoven in the fabric are the familiar designs which mean "good luck" and "long life." The nails upon her fourth and fifth fingers are between four and five inches long, and she wears them in gold. She wears protectors of gold, beautifully chased. In her hands she holds a flat, stiff fan, painted by the court painter, who was her teacher. She paints fans very well herself and has done some good flowers and trees on kakemonos, as rolling screens are called. Beside her is a bowl filled with apples, which signify prosperity. Mr. Vos says that her majesty is very fond of the fragrance of apples.

The second picture is also life-size, but it is painted on a much smaller canvas and is a striking likeness of her majesty as she appears today. She sits upon a rosewood throne and the background is a screen, decorated with the dragons that represent civil authority, which the Manchus call "reaches of purity." Hsu-Hsi, Her Imperial Majesty, the Great Empress Dowager." Beneath this inscription on the background are representations of her three seals of authority.

In this picture she wears a Manchian head-dress similar to that worn in the other, but her robe is blue instead of yellow, and is covered with exquisite symbolical designs embroidered in white silk. She holds a fan in her hand similar to that in the other picture, and shows her nail-protectors, while around her neck is a string of large pearls with a pendant of two black pearl-shaped pearls of unusual size and beauty. The frame of the picture was made by artists of the imperial household, and the robes, which are made of the finest material, are beautifully carved and ornamented with chiselled panels and rosettes.

Her majesty was delighted with both of the pictures and bestowed upon Mr. Vos the order of Knight Commander of the Double Dragon.

MANY GIRLS WILLING

Salvation Army to Find Canadian Husbands for Them.

London, Feb. 19.—To its multifarious agencies the Salvation Army is to add at once that of a matrimonial bureau on a great scale.

This far-reaching decision was taken at a conference of officials in London recently. "We believe that the time has arrived when the army can be of useful service in this respect to the entire world," said Mr. Coombs, territorial commissioner, whose headquarters are in Toronto, Canada.

Work is to be begun forthwith. Fifty marriageable young women will leave London for Canada on the first emigrant steamer, Kensington, which sails March 1, and other will follow soon afterwards.

According to Colonel Lamb, head of the emigration department in London, the Salvation Army will act as chaperone.

"We intend," he said, "to see that a young girl is given a proper introduction and placed in the right society; in fact, to do the practical thing in a common-sense fashion."

"When a girl has a proposal she can have proper advice. If she asks we shall inquire into the character and pedigree of her suitor."

The officials will arrange such entertainments as garden parties and harvest festivals to allow the men from the western plains to meet the young women.

In the meantime, great quantities of letters from girls with matrimonial proclivities are being received by the Salvation Army. Whether or not this is due to the alleged decline of love-making, or to the strong feminine love of romance which finds freer play across the wide ocean and wind-swept plains, the officials have not decided.

Charged With Cruelty.

Ottawa, Feb. 18.—James Kelly, of Masson, Que., is in the Hull Jail, committed for trial on charges of having by cruelty caused the death of Arnold Walsh, an immigrant boy. The boy's fingers and toes were frozen off. He was compelled to work in that condition. He had a suspicious cut over the eye, and the crowning indignity was burying him in vermilion-covered clothes in a coffin six inches too short. The crown will probably lay a charge of manslaughter.

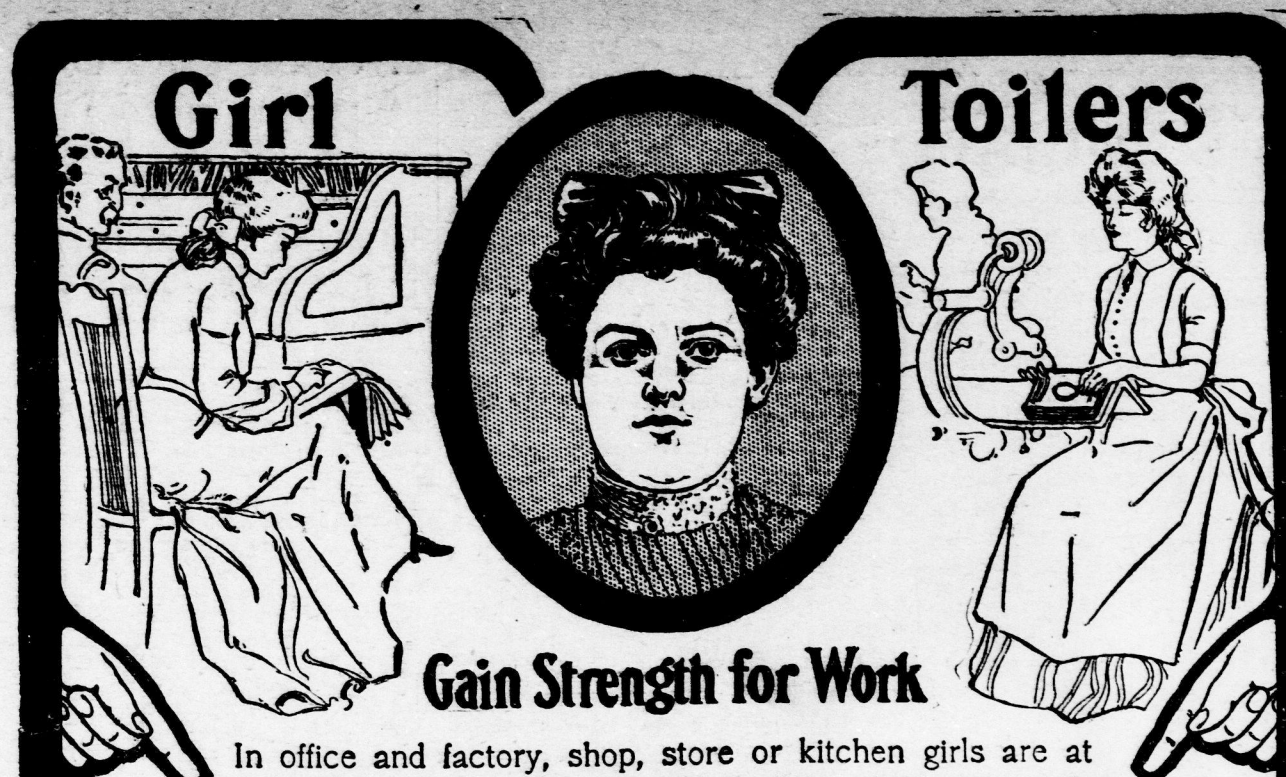
