Will Be Held at Asylum For Insane on June 7.

It is expected that a large number f the medical men of Western Ontario will be in the city on June 7. The London Medical Association will hold their meeting at the asylum on that date, and Dr. Robinson, the superintendent of that institution, has under way a plan to gather all the medical men from the vicinity for a social gathering. He is sending out about 300 invitations, and though probably a good number of the doctors will not be able to be present, still it is hoped that a very large number will be on hand. It is expected that most of the guests will arrive early in the afternoon, and that the greater part of the afternoon will be given up to an inspection of the buildings and grounds, after which a dainty supper will be served. In the business meeting will be held in the large entertainment hall of the institution. At this meeting there will be a paper on "The Pathology of Paresis," by Dr. Ernest Jones, of To-ronto, while there will also be a discussion of some of the interesting pealed. cases that have come under the notice of the staff.
