# **INSURANCE MEN TO** SALVAGE PATROL

Will Consider Purchase of One and Its Addition to London Fire Department Apparatus.

Representatives of a number of London fire insurance companies will get together in the near future to consider the purchasing of a motor fire salvage patrol to be kept at the Central fire station.

Salvage trucks are in use in a great number of Canadian and American cities and have proven their worth in aiding fire departments and reducing insurance losses to a minimum. The men employed, while members of the regular depart-ment, are paid by the companies and the machine is also purchased by those in whose interests it is used

Motor salvage trucks are used to prevent the destruction by water of stock in burning buildings. The machine is manned by a half dozen picked men whose duty it is to get to the scene of a fire and spread waterproofs over stock and parts of the building where the water from the firemen's hose will fall at times.
