### STILL FOR TRIBUTE.

Our Ottawa correspondent sent up effect that the Hon. Mr. Perley had been in consultation with the Admiralty in London, and was returning to Canada with certain alternative proposals from which Mr. Borden is to select his naval policy.

They are, first, the contribution of \$35,000,000 to be applied toward the cost of the three battleships now building; second, the same amount to be spent for new ships to be built by the same authority; third, an annual contribution to the British navy (amount not specified) to be spent as the Admiralty may see fit, supplemented by an application to the same body to send us some ships for home defence-some to be constructed here, if possible. This, of course, is only a rumor: there may be nothing in it. We are not likely to know with certainty until Mr. Borden makes some

public announcement. We are inclined to doubt the rumor, because it represents nothing beyond a continuation of the Government's old and discredited scheme. The first two alternatives are nothing else than last beion's bill. Whether the contribution goes towards building new ships or paying for those now under construction is immaterial. It is a policy which the people have never sanctioned, and which we do not believe they

will sanction, if they ever get an opportunity to express an opinion.

The third is but a variation of the old plan. It involves a permanent tribute, and a total dependence upon the Admiralty. Two things are suggested by the proposal of an annual contribution. The first is that it surrenders the idea of an "emergency." The main argument for offering \$35,-000,000 was that Britain was in need of immediate aid; that she was in danger, and wanted help at once. The wages paid on American ships are: for mates, from \$110 to \$130 and a bonus of \$10 a month; for wheels. men, \$55, and \$65 after Oct. 1.; watchmen, the same; deck hands, \$32, and \$40 after Oct. 1. On the Canadian side mates on all Welland Canal sized ships get \$70 and \$75; second mates, \$50 and \$55; wheelsmen, \$40, and on

some ships \$37.50; watchmen, \$30; deck hands, \$25. It is quite common for a mate aboard a package freighter trading from Montreal to Fort William to be up twenty and thirty hours, and then leave port and be expected to stand a good watch




