**Man at New McCormick Plant Short-Circuits 550-Volt Current.**  
**BODY HELD AS IN A VISE**  
**W. G. Murray, With One Hand on Steel Frame, Groined Behind Switchboard.**

With his left hand on the steel "frame" of a switch in the big oven at the new plant of the McCormick Manufacturing Company, William G. Murray, 130 Egerton street, put his right hand behind the switchboard and short-circuited a current of 550 volts through his body, shortly after 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon. He was revived by the pulmotor which was rushed from fire headquarters by Fire Chief John Aitken. His condition is not serious.

**Saved by Prompt Rescue.**  
By the prompt action of T. P. McCormick who witnessed the accident, Murray would probably have died from the effects of the current. Mr. McCormick, his right hand on the steel frame of the plant, ran to his assistance and, aided by several workmen, pushed Murray away from the switchboard with a plank.

Murray was working in the narrow passage between two large ovens when he received the shock. He had been told that the switchboard was on the steel beside it. For some reason, probably not realizing what he was doing, he groped with his other hand.

**Held Fast by Current.**  
The current held his right hand as in a vise. The man dropped with a scream upon iron pipes, thus making a second short-circuit. He was sent in for the pulmotor and the police ambulance. Both made their way to the plant. In the meantime a first aid nurse, who is kept always at the factory in case of accident, rendered valuable assistance. The shock had burned his hands were badly burned, almost to the bone.

**DARING DAYLIGHT THIEF GETS \$40.50**  
Diamond Ring Worth \$75 Disappears at Same Time, As Cash.

**POLICE WORKING ON CASE**  
**Sam Badalato, East London Merchant, Missed Money and Articles Before.**

A daring, daylight robbery, which took place in East London Monday morning, is at present occupying the attention of the local detective force. The fruit store of Sam Badalato, 638 Dundas street, was visited by a burglar and the sum of \$40.50 and a diamond ring valued at \$75 were carried away.

The burglary was committed shortly after 10 o'clock in the morning, while Mr. Badalato was downtown and Mrs. Badalato was in charge of the store. The money and ring were taken out of a drawer in an upstairs room. The thief entered the store soon after Mr. Badalato had departed, and bought a bag of peanuts. He then asked Mrs. Badalato if he might leave by the back door, as he wanted to go into the lane which runs at the back of the store.

Mrs. Badalato was busy waiting on another customer at the time, and she pointed the way to the back. She thought there was nothing unusual in his going out that way, as she had seen him in the store on various occasions, and people were in the habit of often coming in and out by the back way. A curtain is hung over the door leading from the front to the back part of the store.

The man returned through the back way and went out the front of the store again. Mr. Badalato returned shortly after and went upstairs to get some money he had left in a drawer, to be deposited in the bank. There was more than \$200 in the roll, and it was made up of ten, five and two and one-dollar bills, together with a five-cent piece. He had made out a deposit slip when he counted the money, and when he opened the drawer he picked out the money without counting it and took it to the bank.

**Shortage Noticed at Bank.**  
It was the teller who noticed the shortage. The silver was \$2.50 short of the amount marked on the deposit slip and six of the five-dollar bills were missing. The rest of the money was intact. Thinking the missing money had been left in the drawer, Mr. Badalato returned to the bank, but could not find it. The diamond ring, which had only been bought last week and been worn only once by Mrs. Badalato, was also gone. A diamond stickpin that was in the drawer was found on the floor. A solid gold watch chain, of a peculiar Italian pattern, was left untouched. About \$8 that reposed in the pocket of Mr. Badalato's London trousers had been taken, however.

**Police Working On Case.**  
The police were informed of the robbery and Detectives Nickle and Brown are working on the case. A good description of the man has been secured. According to Mr. Badalato, he has missed small sums of money and other articles in the past, but he has not been able to think of more about it. Now he believes he has been systematically robbed from time to time.
