GLAUBITZ CHARGES ARE STILL PENDING

Aldermen Stay Away From Meeting—Lack of Quorum Ties Hands.

WILL MEET WEDNESDAY
Another Session Called, When Disposal of Question Will Be Attempted.

With only four members present, the city council adjourned the meeting held yesterday afternoon to refer the charges against H. J. Glaubitz and A. O. Hunt, of the public utilities commission, to County Judge MacBeth. Mayor Graham announced that another meeting would be held Wednesday afternoon to dispose of the question. Those present were: Controllers Percy Moore and H. Ashplant, and Aldermen El. Stein and James Donnelly. Controller Rose informed the mayor early in the day that he would not be able to attend the meeting, while Ald. Frank White was reported sick in bed. "I had an inkling that many would stay away from the meeting," said Mayor Graham, as the time expired and no quorum was present, "but I fail to see what is to be gained by their action."

"I'll do something about it," said H. Winder, who was in front of the city hall when the meeting was declared adjourned, said he had agreed with some of the other aldermen to stay away from the meeting, as they figured something was going to be "slipped over" on them.

"We disposed of this matter," said Ald. Winder, "and gave the utilities commission every chance to present their side of the case, but they refused to answer all our questions, and some of their employees would not even appear before the committee to be heard. We have referred the charges to the military authorities, and it is for the military authorities to say that they cannot take action, and not the public utilities commission."

"Time to Reply." "We gave the committee ample opportunity to reply to these charges against Glaubitz and Hunt, but they took no notice until they found the people wanted to know the truth of the whole affair, and then before we got an answer back from the military authorities they want us to meet and dispose of the question according to their notion of how it should be solved. The aldermen do not propose to be mere puppets of the utilities commission."

Those who remained away from the meeting were Aldermen Winder, Wilton, Leck, McDonald, Givens, McPherson, Hanes, Tawcock, Mitchell and White and Controller Rose.

CITY-WIDE CAMPAIGN FOR S. LONDON BRIDGE
A committee, with A. M. Hunt and Thomas H. James at its head, will conduct a campaign in the city, and especially in South London, in an effort to have the bylaw passed at the January elections favoring the construction of a bridge at the foot of Richmond street.

The figures of the city engineer show the cost of the construction of the bridge would be about \$16,000. According to A. M. Hunt, the increased traffic in the district, and the fact that the bridge, would pay for its construction. This is the chief point in the argument of the bridge campaigners.

The mother of the girl informed the police that she was not yet seventeen. Upon the return of the groom, he was arrested. He was remanded to jail, and his wife could be secured from London.

GERMANS "SEE THINGS."
LONDON, Dec. 28.—A Copenhagen dispatch to the Daily Mail, referring to a report published by the Hamburger Freidenblatt, that German airmen dropped bombs on the German island Langoewe, in the North Sea, Christmas day, killing several civilians, says that an investigation proved that it was not British who dropped the bombs, but German airmen who believed that British torpedo boats were lurking off the island in the fog.

WOULD REDUCE MAYOR'S SALARY

Dr. Stevenson Promises If Elected To Revoke Bylaw.

WILL NOT ACCEPT \$1,000
Says Mayor Should Not Draw Salary From Two Civic Bodies.

There will be a great many alterations to the present systems at the city hall if Dr. Stevenson is elected mayor for 1915. In an interview the doctor said that his first move after election would be to have the present mayor's salary of \$1,000 a year, as a member of the board of control, revoked, so that in future no mayor could receive two salaries. "I will also endeavor to correct the present system of charging for hydro lighting," he continued. If the utilities commission had been facing a deficit, to introduce the present system of charging for lighting, but with a surplus there was absolutely no reason for it. "One of my reasons for not seeking reelection to the utilities commission is that I feel that there are many things that can be remedied, and the mayor of the city," he continued, "should be more cheaply constructed and maintained at smaller cost. "These common funds can be laid by day labor—a principle which has been followed advantageously since I have been on the utilities commission—and will furnish work for a large number of our citizens and employers rather than for gangs of men imported by outside contractors."

Dr. Stevenson is also deeply interested in the level crossing question, and promises to give it considerable attention next year.—Adv.

EVERY MAN OF 18TH RETURNS TO CITY

All Answer To Company Roll Call At 10:30 Last Night.

OFFICERS ARE PLEASED
Reliance Placed In Their Men Justified By Latter's Conduct.

Since dismissal was sounded after the Christmas dinner given the men at the new plant of the McCormick Manufacturing Company, East London, Thursday afternoon, they have been free to go where they pleased through special orders made by Lieut.-Col. E. S. Wile. The majority of the men left the city for their homes, with instructions to report on Monday. No time was specified, although it was generally understood that there would be a roll call at 10:30 last night, and that the men were to return to the city on the first train yesterday morning. The Eighteenth men started to arrive, and by noon the big camp at Queen's Park and the barracks had returned the battle that has marked them since the battalion was mobilized here. Afternoon trains from north, south, east and west brought their quota of troops into the city, and by 6 o'clock last night the entire battalion could have been marshalled full strength, had the order been given. Officers of the battalion last night voiced their satisfaction at the manner in which the men had returned to camp on time, and prepared to tackle cheerfully the strenuous drills that will follow, until orders are received for the unit to leave for overseas service.
