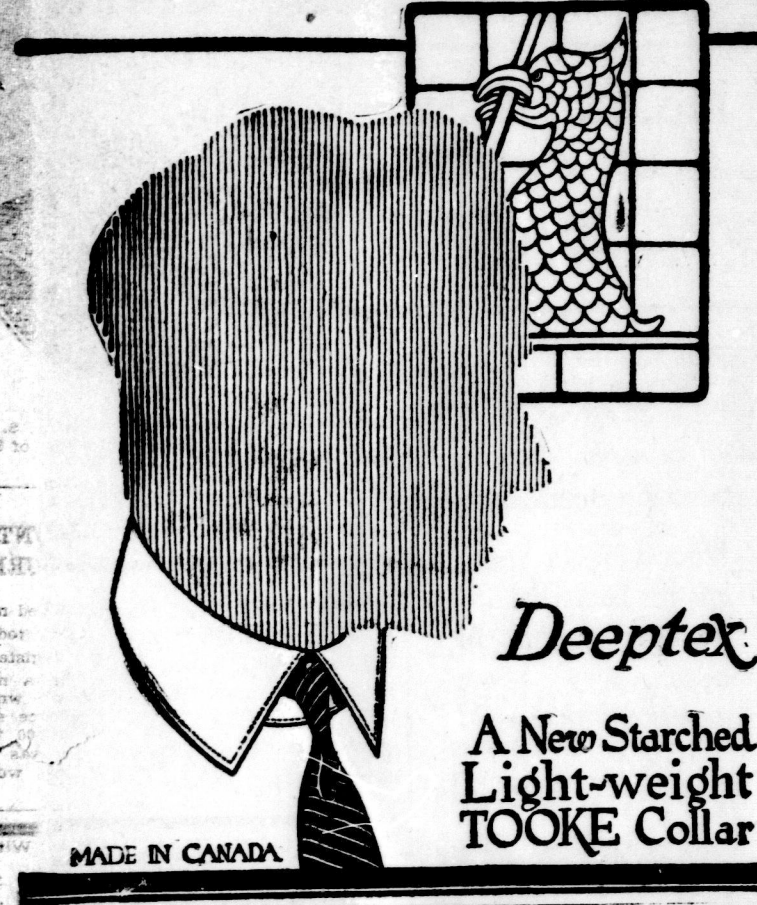


INDIANS DEMAND FAIR TREATMENT

BRANTFORD, April 6.—Disatisfaction with the committee which had been endeavoring to secure fair play from the Canadian Government over the question of compulsory enfranchisement featured the gathering of the Six Nations council of chiefs this afternoon at Oshawa council house. The old committee was discharged and a new one appointed, which favored the retention of Dr. Bates and Lawyer Decker of Syracuse, N. Y., who promised that they could make the Canadian Government live up to its fair play. No reference was made to the Syracuse story of emigration of the Six Nations to their old home in the Mohawk Valley.

Ontario Referendum Committee

RESIGNATION OF MINISTER IS DEMANDED

Ernest Lapointe Makes Bitter Attack On Hon. Gideon Robertson.

MEIGHEN TO THE RESCUE

Declares That Member For East Quebec Has Confused the Issues.

OTTAWA, April 6.—(Canadian Press) Demands for the resignation of Hon. G. D. Robertson, minister of labor, were made today during a debate on the subject of Catholic national unions, percolated in the House of Commons on a motion to go into supply, by Ernest Lapointe, member for Quebec East.

Mr. Lapointe declared that the minister of labor had been unfair in his treatment of the delegates from the national unions, and that he had discriminated against them in favor of the international unions. The national union had asked for representation in the forthcoming building trades conference, and not only had that been refused, but the delegation had been informed by the minister that their unions were dangerous and were liable to cause racial strife.

Defended Labor.

Mr. Lapointe declared that he was just as good a friend of labor as was Senator Robertson. While Senator Robertson was in Winnipeg, openly siding with the employers, and sending frantic appeals to the Government for help, he (Mr. Lapointe) was on the floor of the Commons defending the right of labor to collective bargaining.

The prime minister, replying, declared that Mr. Lapointe had "triumphantly" confused the issues with a long statement of utterly impracticable principles, all the time assuming that one or other of these had been violated by the minister. The building trades conference was between employers and labor in the building trades. These two parties had asked for the conference and the national union were not eligible for representation. The minister had not appointed the delegates to the conference to get together in Ottawa. The premier had asked for the conference to the disinterested work of Senator Robertson in the interests of labor for many years.

Tables Correspondence.

At the opening of the House the prime minister tabled the correspondence which had passed between the Government and Sir Alfred Smithers, chairman of the board of directors of the Grand Trunk Railway Company, with regard to extension of time on the arbitration award, and also regarding further financial aid to the company. The speaker announced that he had received the resignation of Sir Thomas White as member for Leeds.

In the evening the House took up in committee the non-contentious items in the estimates of the department of railways and canals.

The House adjourned at 11:22 p.m., after passing the item of \$202,025 for salaries, and \$28,000 for contingencies.

Gives the Facts.

Premier Meighen tabled the correspondence between the Government and the Grand Trunk Railway Company relative to the question of an extension of time for the arbitration proceedings, when the House resumed the afternoon. The prime minister said that while the correspondence was not complete, he felt that the situation was such that the House should know where the parties to the agreement stood. Just prior to the sitting of the House Mr. Meighen said he had received a further letter from the Grand Trunk, containing legal arguments supporting the proposal of an extension of the time. Speaker Rhodes informed the House that he had received the resignation of Sir Thomas White (Leeds) as a member of the House of Commons.

On the motion to go into committee of supply, Ernest Lapointe (Quebec East) rose to discuss what he declared was a matter of great public importance in connection with the recent statements of the minister of labor, Hon. G. D. Robertson, regarding the Catholic national unions.

Lapointe introduced the delegation from the union to the minister, and acted in the capacity of interpreter of the statements of the minister and the delegates from the National Union.

Previous to the interview he had no knowledge of the resolutions which were to be placed before the minister by the delegates. The minister had stated that the demands could not be granted, and had started a violent attack on the union and its officers. Their work, the minister had said, was nefarious and very dangerous. He had declared that the members of the international bodies would refuse to sit on boards with those of the National Labor Union.

Mr. Lapointe did not believe the minister of labor had been fair in stating that members of the international

unions would not sit with members of the National Union.

Mr. Lapointe then read to the House a dispatch covering the interview sent from Ottawa by Canadian Press, Limited, in which Senator Robertson, limited, had warned the delegates of the danger of racial and religious strife as an outgrowth of the Catholic National Union movement.

Criticized Attitude.

He also read an editorial which appeared the following day in the Montreal Gazette. The editorial strongly criticized the attitude taken by the minister of labor. A lengthy letter written by Senator Robertson to the Montreal Gazette, in reply to the editorial, was also read by Mr. Lapointe who stated, in doing so, that he was anxious to be absolutely fair to the minister of labor.

Mr. Lapointe declared he had never been a member of any labor organization, but spoke from the standpoint of fairness and justice.

The department of labor had its duties prescribed by statute. One of its most important functions was the maintenance of industrial harmony between employers and employees and between groups of employees themselves.

Causes Trouble.

The minister of labor was supposed to be fair-minded, but by lack of vision, narrowness of mind or bias, his usefulness was gone, and he was only a cause of trouble.

There was nothing in any statute demanding the resignation of the minister of labor. While the minister of labor was in the House, he should not allow his preference to reflect in the performance of his public duty. He had no right to discriminate against either organization. Freedom of association in Canada was a privilege which no minister could destroy.

Quoting from the platform of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, Mr. Lapointe said one of its planks was abolition of the Senate. This was decidedly humorous, he said, in view of the fact that the present minister of labor was a member of the Senate.

Mr. Lapointe doubted whether P. M. Draper should be allowed to represent Canadian labor at meetings in foreign countries, his experience with the Government, while drawing a salary as an employee of the Government, was not a recommendation.

While Senator Robertson was in Winnipeg openly siding with the employers, and sending frenzied appeals to the Government for help, he (Mr. Lapointe) was on the floor of the Commons defending the right of labor to collective bargaining.

He submitted that Senator Robertson had shown himself to be utterly unfit to occupy the high position of minister of labor.

Outlines Situation.

In reply to Mr. Lapointe, Hon. Mr. Meighen outlined the situation in some detail. The Federal Building Trades Federation, composed of various unions in different parts of the country, on the one hand, and the Federal Association of Builders, on the other, employees and employers, had agreed to a conference to establish industrial councils in the building trades. The conference was composed of five named by the employees' association, and five named by the employers' association. The question arose, as the two parties to the conference should be held for the promotion of better relations. The question arose, as the minister of labor invited them to meet in Ottawa, a delegation from the Grand Trunk Railway Company, representing an aggregate of some 30,000 members, of whom 700 were in the building trades. None of these unions was party to the agreement and were not eligible for representation at the forthcoming conference.

Read the Letter.

The prime minister read a letter which the minister of labor had sent to the secretary of the delegation, in which he had waited upon him. This letter pointed out that the forthcoming conference was one in which the minister of labor was waiting upon the convenience of the meeting. He was not appointing delegates, otherwise he would have had pleasure in including representation from their unions. The letter had concluded with the assurance that if the Quebec unions in question wished to arrange such a conference the department of labor would have pleasure in extending the same courtesies.

After quoting letters which passed between the officers of the Catholic unions and the minister of labor to show that the latter was anxious to secure peace and goodwill between all sections of the labor movement, Premier Meighen referred to the Winnipeg strike as follows:

Dangerous Situation.

"There is an organization in the west which, in the minister's judgment, had much to do with the Winnipeg strike. I am sorry to see Mr. Lapointe try to lead the House to believe that in that great conflict his complicity was wholly with those who precipitated that conflict, some of whom were found guilty by unanimous verdict of juries. I did not know he would stand in this House and plead their cause, while he was at the same time pleading for the restoration of order in one of the most dangerous and difficult situations ever known in Canadian history."

The premier concluded that a large majority of fair unbiased and impartial Catholics and Protestants, and all sections of labor, and that the latter's conduct throughout the whole matter had brought credit and honor to his country to the high honor which he held.

PROHIBITION MAY BE DECIDING FACTOR IN WAKEFORD CHARGES

Archdeacon's Case Comes Up Before Privy Council Today.

LONDON, April 6.—The appeal of Archdeacon Wakeford, one of the most eloquent clerics in the north of England, against the decision of the ecclesiastical court finding him guilty of adultery comes up before the privy council tomorrow.

The allegations upon which Archdeacon Wakeford was found guilty were (1) that he committed adultery with an unknown woman on March 14 and 15 and 2, 1920, at the Bull Hotel, Peterborough, and (2) that he consorted with and occupied same bedroom as a woman who was not his wife. The ecclesiastical trial the archdeacon pleaded that it was a case of mistaken identity.

On appeal the archdeacon, when leave of appeal was sought, contended that testimony about a couple occupying a room in the hotel on certain days referred to a Mr. and Mrs. Blundon, who corroborated this view. A humorous remark to the contention that the archdeacon was identified by his pyjamas. His counsel claim to be able to prove that he wears a nightshirt, and not pyjamas.

ESTATE MAY BE VALUED AT \$10,000,000

Petrolia Mourns Death of J. L. Englehart, Pioneer Oil Man.

GAVE HOSPITAL TO TOWN

Lavished Money On Institution As Memorial To Himself and Wife.

[Special To The Advertiser.]

PETROLIA, April 6.—Widespread regret was occasioned here today when news was received of the death of J. L. Englehart. The flags on the municipal buildings are at half-mast, and everywhere it is felt that the town has lost its best friend. As a result of Mr. Englehart's generosity Petrolia has the finest and best equipped hospital of any town in Canada, and this was only one of his benefactions.

Mr. Englehart's wealth is estimated at between \$6,000,000 and \$10,000,000, and there is a good deal of interest here regarding what disposition he has made of his wealth.

Company Benefit Largely.

It was stated to The Advertiser tonight that not long ago in conversation with a prominent citizen he intimated that he was making large provision for important extensions in connection with the local hospital, and that the work would go on even if he passed away.

No matter how busy he was or how large the project in which he was engaged he always had a warm spot in his heart for the town and came back whenever he could. His citizenship in Petrolia dates back half a century to the early '60s. During that time his business took him to other points he always maintained his apartments in the Masonic Temple, and whenever possible came home, if it were only for a short time.

Keen Businessman.

The enterprise with which he was most closely associated in the earlier years of the town was the Imperial Oil Company.

He was vice-president and general manager of the company for many years, retiring from active control of the plant when removed to Sarnia some 20 years ago.

He was a large oil producer as well, in politics he was a Conservative. He was a member of the Anglican Church at Petrolia and a member of the Masonic Order.

A Magnificent Gift.

The act that has most endeared him to the people of Petrolia and the central part of Lambton County is the gift of the Charlotte Eleanor Englehart Hospital, named after the late Mrs. Englehart, who before her death, which took place fourteen years ago, suggested to her husband the gift of a hospital to the town.

Those who knew the dead financier and his wife intimately state that their home life was ideal. His wife's death was a keen blow to him, and her wishes regarding the establishment of a hospital were carried out in every particular. Last year a modern nurses' home was erected on the grounds costing \$5,000. This year extensions to the hospital buildings are under way, all additional gifts by the original donors.

Another semi-public gift by Mr. Englehart was a chime of bells to the Anglican Church here, just among all of his activities the hospital seemed to have the largest place in his plans. He was unbounded in his generosity towards it and expended more than
