Refuses To Recognize Either Middlesex or Huron Big Four Leagues Until Affiliation With O. B. A.

Clifford club also player James Newman applied and was granted reinstatement from suspension put into effect in 1921 for his actions during the season. The case of Alisa Craig affiliating with the Middlesex League and the Huron League was taken up and discussed by a very lengthy discussion. A. will be notified and must play under N. W. B. A. rules only and under suspension. For the time being, should any club of the N. W. B. A. wish to play with either of these or any unrecognized league they must make application to the N. W. B. A. secretary for special permit to engage in exhibition game, giving date and date, and will be required to furnish this official with an official umpire's report of the game. The report blank will accompany the permit in all cases, and should any club fail to report fully as required, further permits to such club will be cancelled and their affiliation with the N. W. B. A. cease, and they will automatically go into suspension. Every club must stick with the N. W. B. A. and use only players who have official N. W. B. A. certificates with that respective club.

Elora Club has not made application through any of the respective officers for reinstatement in the N. W. B. A., but Harold Arthur of Elora had applied for reinstatement for this club and had sent sufficient funds to clear up the financial debt of the suspended club. Mr. Arthur's attitude was highly commended, and he is to be written by the N. W. B. A. to this effect and advised that should Elora wish to now affiliate with the N. W. B. A. the suspension will be raised, otherwise will remain in effect until the close of the 1922 playing season; this on the grounds that there was a possibility of this club merely wishing to negotiate to take part in some other league which was not upheld.

Frank M. Boyle of Exeter had applied for reinstatement, and to a small extent was successful. His suspension was raised, but the sub-committee could not see their way clear to reinstatement him as an official umpire in the N. W. B. A.

All schedules must be drawn by the conveners and the draft up in the hands of Secretary.
