

Delinquents Face Penalty of \$10 For Every Day Returns Are in Arrears.

WARD 1 MAIN OFFENDER

Commissioner Grant "Going Right Down List and Summons Them All."

One hundred businessmen of London, who have disregarded notices served by the city to file income tax returns, will be summoned to police court next week, Assessment Commissioner Ste phen Grant informed The Advertiser Saturday morning.

Mr. Grant pointed out that the penalty which those offenders may be called upon to pay is a fine of ten dollars for every day that the income ax returns are delayed.

As these returns in the case of the one hundred Londoners are long overdue, they may be called upon to pay heavy fines if the court so rules. As they have been notified several times by the assessment department, Mr. Grant states that failure to file the returns is not an oversight and that there is no excuse which may be reasonably offered by the defense "There are about one hundred citi-

ens who are going to be summ o police court to explain why they have not filed income tax returns, said Mr. Grant. "They will not come to us, so we will go to them.
