sufficient energy to warrant even
passing interest. And The Adver-

contact with those supposed to be
the mayor's opponents that, if any
selection is made, it will not be one
of this number.

Mayor Wenig suggested that, with
one or two exceptions, they looked
to him as though a portion had been
extracted from the supporters' com-
mittee of the citizens' committee—an
echo of the last municipal election.

MAKE EVERY EFFORT TO SECURE CONVICTION

White Plains Attorney-Gen-
eral Increase Force to
Maximum.

White Plains, N. Y., Sept. 20.—In
the legal battle for the life of Walter
S. Ward, wealthy baker's son, ac-
cused of the murder of Clarence Pet-
ters, new forces will be arrayed in
the defense of the accused today. Al-
ready the attorney-general's forces
have been increased to a maximum.
Dr. Otto Schultz, noted pathologist,
and William Jones, former pistol ex-
pert of the New York police de-
partment, took their places beside defense
lawyers yesterday. It is expected
that Dr. Schultz' mission is to check
the testimony of Dr. Henry J. Vier,
who performed the autopsy on Pet-
ters' body. It was said, will be called
upon to prove that the gun claimed
by the state to have been given
Ward by the chief of police of New
Rochelle, N. Y., was one belonging
to the murdered man. Ward made
this claim in his original blackmail
story.

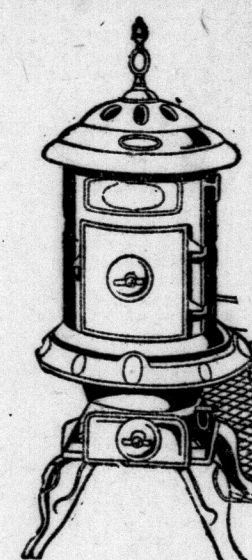
CANADIAN AUTOMOBILE INDUSTRY GAINING GROUND

Canadian Press Despatch.
Ottawa, Sept. 20.—Passenger au-
tomobiles exported from Canada in August
numbered 4,245, valued at \$1,731,776, as
compared with 2,716, valued at \$1-
586,924 in August a year ago, as reg-
istered by the Dominion Bureau of
Statistics.
For the twelve months ending Aug-
ust, Canada exported 53,620 auto-
mobiles, compared with 24,600 during
the corresponding twelve months a
year earlier. Last month's exports
went to some fifty different coun-
tries. Australia taking 1,220, being
the largest customer. New Zealand
bought 816 Canadian cars and British
South Africa 86. British India was
customer for 364.

ALL CANADIAN SILVER GOES TO UNITED STATES

Canadian Press Despatch.
Ottawa, Sept. 20.—Exports of Cana-
dian silver contained in ore, concen-
trates, etc., during August were
\$12,731 ounces, according to the Do-
minion Bureau of Statistics. The
whole went to the United States. For
the twelve months ending August,
exports totalled 628,293 ounces,
compared with 460,949 ounces for
the previous twelve months.

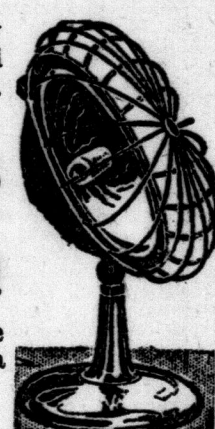

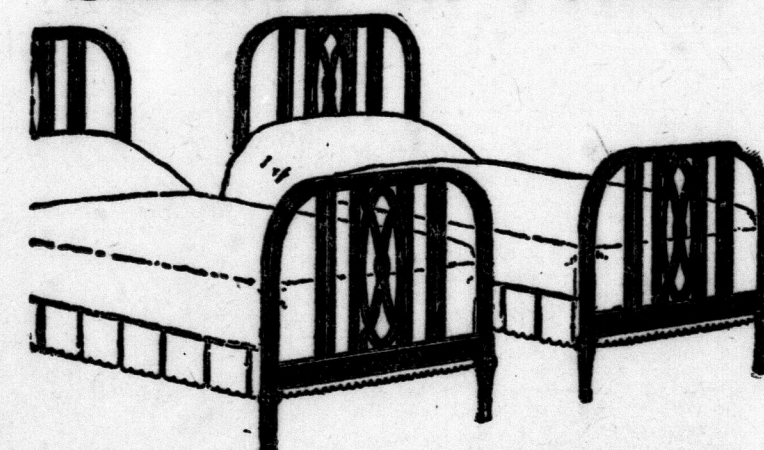

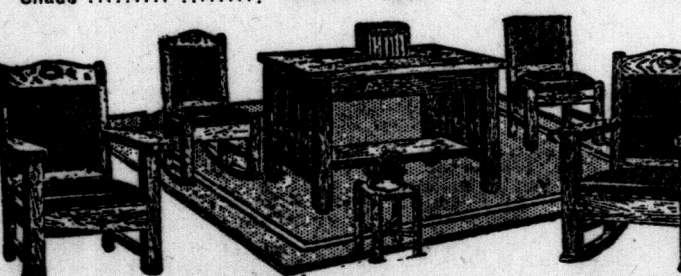
