



## Local Maple Leafs Eliminate Dome "Miners" From Connaught Cup Series, In Far North Tilt

### Maple Leafs Defeat Miners In Far North 2 Goals To 1

Ten Minutes Overtime Gives Local Eleven Victory in Connaught Cup First Round—Hazelwood Scores Winning Goal.

South Porcupine, Ont., June 10.—The Dome Mines football team was eliminated from the Connaught Cup competition last evening at their home grounds by the Maple Leaf Football Club of London, Ont., but it was only after ninety minutes of a hard-fought, strenuous contest, followed by ten minutes overtime that the winners of the game emerged victorious by 2 goals to 1. The teams were 25 minutes late in taking the field, owing to nearly one hour's delay on the T. and N. O. Railway service, and 1,500 spectators saw them a hearty greeting. It was the largest crowd ever seen at a football game in the history of the camp, and the scene will long be remembered by those who were present. The Timmins Citizens Band was on the grounds. ### BATTLING SIKI ALREADY TO SAIL FOR NEW YORK

Paris, June 10.—Battling Siki, the Senegalese fighter, announced his departure for New York on June 22. He will fight Morelle in Paris on June 15, but refuses to meet Marcel Nilles on June 8, although articles for this fight were duly signed before the French Boxing Federation ten days ago. Siki claims that the man who acted in his behalf in signing this contract was not authorized to do so.

There are no less than five men now claiming to hold Siki's power of attorney to transact business for him. The French Federation, however, is investigating the matter and may force Siki to meet Nilles before the black man leaves for the United States.

### IS CALGARY GOING DRY OR EDMONTON SICKER?

Reports Show Great Deal More Liquor Consumed in Alberta's Capital.

Edmonton, Alta., June 9.—Is Calgary going dry or Edmonton sicker? The vendors' store at Edmonton during May sold \$19,845.30 worth of liquor—to sick persons, of course. The vendors' store in Calgary only had a turnover of \$4,558.50. (Calgary seems to be becoming a marvellously healthy town.)

These figures are given out by Attorney-General Brownlee from a report submitted by R. B. Douglas, chief of the vendor of the province. For the month of April the difference between the Edmonton and Calgary dispensaries was even greater in the sale results than in May. Then the figures were \$20,000 for Edmonton, and only \$3,520 for Calgary in round figures.

### CANADIANS CONFER ON ALIEN PROPERTY

Dominion Officials Hold Consultation At Washington With U. S. Secretary.

Washington, June 11.—A party of Canadian officials arrived in Washington Sunday to confer with Secretary Hughes and representatives of alien property custodians' office to work out a uniform practice for the disposition of certain large holdings of seized property on both sides of the boundary.

The conference grows out of the fact that the United States custodian has taken over shares of Canadian corporations which were supposed to be owned by Germans in this country, while the Canadians likewise have possession of themselves of properties of American origin owned by Germans living in Canada.

Efforts have been made with varying degrees of success by the German owners to recover these properties, and it is regarded as desirable that the same general rule shall be applied by each country. There are many complex questions to be discussed, and the conference will continue for some time.

### BATTLING SIKI TO TRAIN AT LONG ISLAND CAMP

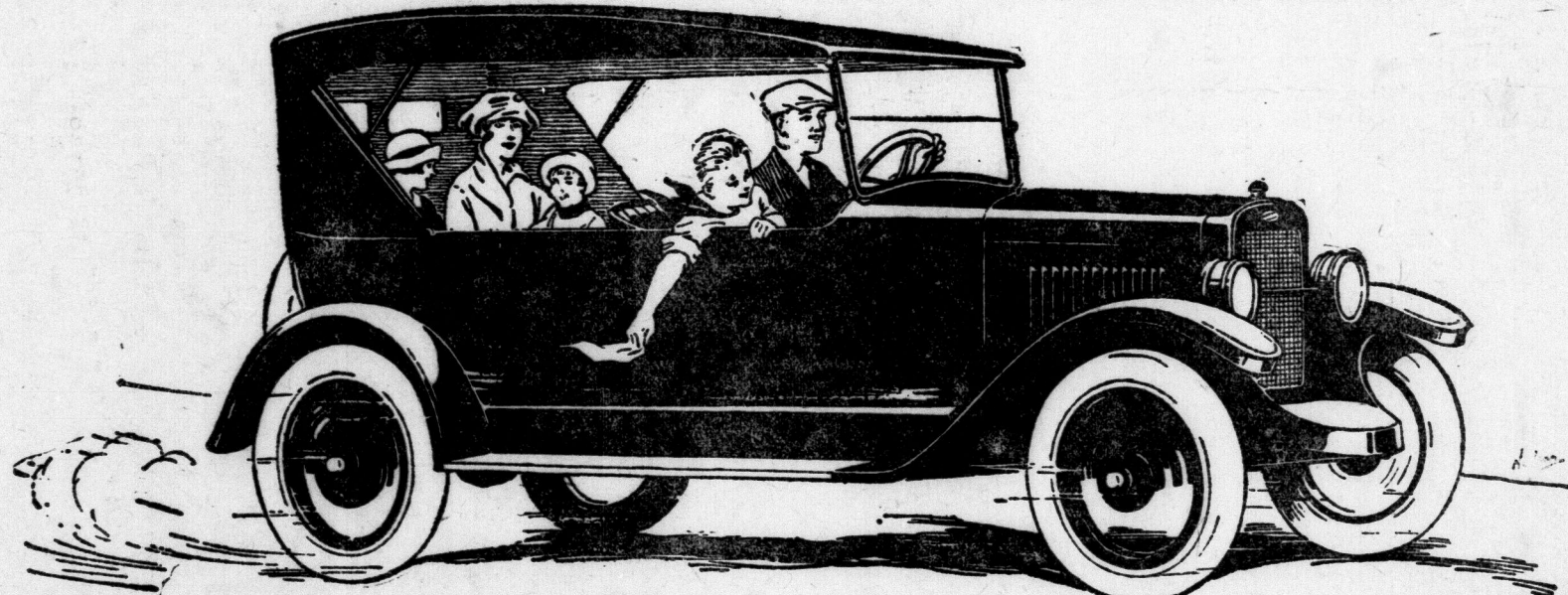
