Nurses Would Place Ban On Smoking By Patients; Ontario Convention Opens

Delegates Disapprove of Smokes, Fearing Fire in Hospital Beds.
DISCUSS PROBLEMS
Many Important Resolutions Will Be Brought Before Today's Session.

The 150 graduate nurses from all Ontario convening in London just now, occupied yesterday afternoon with a series of round-table conferences, in which every phase of nursing activity was discussed. Several important resolutions referring to public health nursing and nursing education will be brought before the general conference of Ontario graduate nurses, which opens session again this morning in Wesley Hall.

"Should patients be allowed to smoke in hospitals?" was one of the many interesting questions which came before the conference on nursing education held in Victoria hospital, with Miss E. MacPherson Dickson in charge. It was pointed out that if helpless patients were permitted to smoke fire might result. However, the conference decided that it was not its place to regulate against such a habit, but that it would put itself on record as not approving of smoking in hospital.

Hours For Nurses.
The agenda for the conference included such important matters as 20-hour duty for special nurses, the standardizing of smaller hospitals, the requirements for pupils entering nursing training schools, the requirements for graduation, the qualifications of a registered nurse, and how

Several interesting demonstrations were given during the adjourning, the Alexandra Munn conducting the demonstration of standard training school records for the province; Miss Laura C. E. of infant feeding, and Miss N. E. MacPherson of nursing procedures. Miss Grace Fairley led a discussion on the serving of hot meals to patients.

Public Health Work.
Dr. H. W. Hill of the Institute of Public Health was the chief speaker at the public health conference held in Wesley Hall yesterday afternoon, his subject being "Public Health Nursing of the Future."

The speaker explained that public health nursing was divided into two activities, prevention of disease and promotion of health. Along the latter line the public health nursing had been advancing rapidly. There were pre-natal clinics, child welfare clinics, tuberculosis clinics and so on for the promotion of health in the community. It was in the field of disease prevention that the public health nurse of the future must develop along both lines.

To illustrate his point, Dr. Hill referred to an epidemic which broke out in a small Minnesota town in 1908, when he used public health nurses for the first time. There were 500 cases of typhoid and although every available nurse was working, many of the patients had to be nursed by members of their own families. Dr. Hill knew from experience that a good many of these untrained nurses would infect themselves from their patients, because of their ignorance of the way to look after them. So a plan was tried out.

Two of the trained nurses were secured. They did not actual nursing themselves but went from house to house teaching the untrained nurses not only how to look after the sick properly, but to protect themselves in so doing. Thus, 50 or 60 were properly nursed, where only four patients might have benefited from the knowledge of these two nurses. From this time on, the community maintained a public health nurse, and it was considered exceedingly worthwhile.

Other Discussions.
Other important discussions during the afternoon were on "The Vis-

iting Nurse," led by Miss Kate Cowan of the Victorian Order of Nurses; "The Nurse in the School," led by Miss M. Lambie of New Zealand, now of the Toronto department of health; "The Nurse in the Hospital," led by Miss Viola Henderson of the Toronto general hospital; "Canadian Red Cross Society," led by Miss M. E. Wilkinson; "The Nurse in Industry," led by Mrs. Sylvia of New Ontario; "Mothers' Allowances," the paper read by Miss Gertrude Barty on behalf of her sister, Miss Helen Barty.

A third conference on "Private Duty Nursing" was led by Miss Helen Carruthers, and included discussion on extension courses for graduate nurses and employment of pupil nurses on special duty in hospitals.

Following the adjournment of the conference, the delegates were entertained at a banquet in the Smallman & Ingram dining-room, over which Miss Agnes Malloch presided.

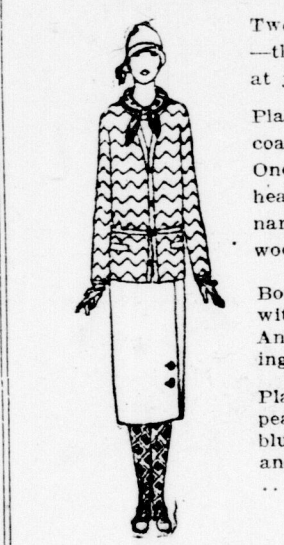

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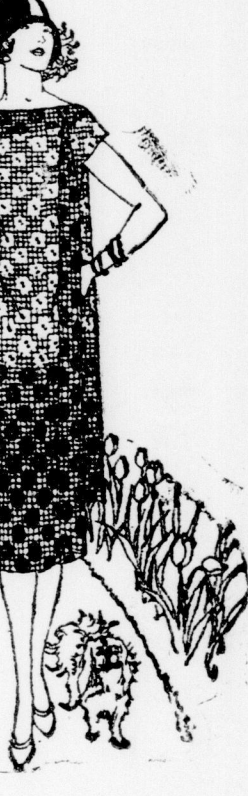
