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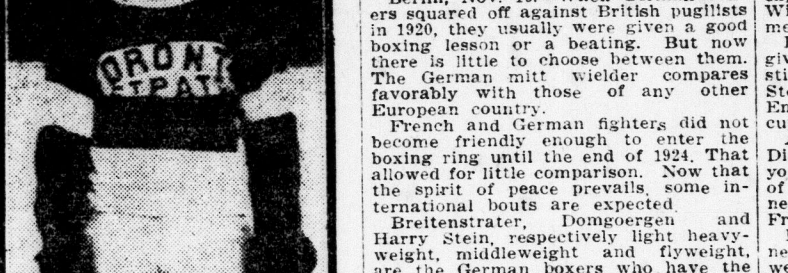

WAMBY ASSUMES MANAGERIAL ROLE

Hero of Unassisted Double Play in 1920 Series Goes To Mobile.

New York, Nov. 17.—Bill Wambagness—better known as "Wamby"—second baseman of the Boston Americans, hero of the unassisted triple play in the world series of 1920, and accurate fielder in general, is on the way to be manager of the Mobile club of the Southern association.

The infield of the Cleveland club has never been quite the same since Wamby was transferred to Boston. In his first year in Boston he was one of the best infielders in the American league, despite his years of experience and his reputation for being a "broke" player. Wamby has never had managerial experience, as he went straight out of the Cleveland club to Boston in 1924. He was born in Cleveland, and first played baseball with the Cleveland Indians.

This business of having baseball players and managers writing for the papers during the winter months has worked up a lot of opposition among the professional newspaper writers. The New York chapter of the Baseball Writers' Association of America has passed a resolution which virtually prohibits the practice, while the other chapters, particularly the one at Chicago, have been in charge of the matter. There the writers had gone to the Cleveland club and taken a similar attitude was taken by James M. Gould of St. Louis, president of the association.

The New Yorkers simply decided it was not proper for them to write about a player who was a manager. The matter will appear in the papers.

German Mitt Welders Show Vast Improvement Since War

Berlin, Nov. 16.—When German boxers squared off against British pugilists in 1920, they usually were given a good boxing lesson or a beating. But now there is little to choose between them. The German mitt welder compares favorably with those of any other European country.

French and German fighters did not become friendly enough to enter the boxing ring until the end of 1924. That allowed for little comparison. Now that the spirit of peace prevails some international bouts are expected.

Breitenstrater, Domoegren and Harry Stein, Harry Poly light heavy weight, middleweight and flyweight, are the German boxers who have the best chance to conquer the title of champion of Europe in their class.

Breitenstrater holds the position and enjoys the same popularity as did Carpenter in France some four years ago. The people call him "Han," just as the French were wont to call the French idol "Georges" in the old days.

He is a clean living, modest, good-looking young fellow and deserves his popularity. He is very fast for his weight, has a right which is not to be held too lightly, and is as game as a cat. He is a real fighter, and before he knew as much about fighting as he does now, he met Arthur Person and the indefatigable Baiting Siki, and the German was never a better fighter.

His fight against Paulino Usakum, the "Mountain Lion" of the Pyrenees, was a real masterpiece. Domoegren has dubbed him "will be watched with great interest. They meet in the old days."

Domoegren of Cologne is the best of the middleweights. He has met and defeated in France both Domoegren and Faumelle, who rank among the best in that country.

The Cologne battler is expected to take the title away from Wiegert, the present holder, when they meet here in December.

Harry Stein, also of Cologne, would give any of the flyweights in Europe a stiff argument. Both Domoegren and Stein learned their boxing with the English professors in the army of occupation.

Among the heavies Samson Koerner, Diener of Magdeburg—a 20-year-old youth; Dickmann of Hanover; Haymann of Leipzig and Wagner of Dortmund need not fear to meet the best in France and England.

In the light heavyweight class, Koerner and Dickmann, who can make the weight and be strong, Melting of Dresden, and Smalning of Cologne, form a quartet which would not be out of tune in any time in Europe.

The welterweight class furnishes the largest number of fighters. Kurt Prenzel, Milenz, Domoegren and Wiegert rank highest among the middleweights.

BRITISH ADMIRALTY FOR ABOLITION OF SUBMARINES

London, Nov. 17.—Inquiries at the admiralty today showed that the British policy, which advocated complete abolition of submarines by all nations at the Washington conference, now has been definitely reaffirmed.

The admiralty intimates the hope that some international action to this end is practicable at the present time, despite the failure of the British argument at Washington.

The admiralty points out that any international agreement outlawing submarines presented almost insuperable difficulties on account of the avowed opposition of France and possible opposition of the United States, but it is understood that if any nation sets the ball rolling the British will go the limit, regarding the principles announced by Lord Balfour at Washington.
