Toronto, Ont., July 1.—The pressure is
above the average from the lake region
eastward, and there is a shallow depres-
sion approaching Lake Superior from the
north-west. The weather to-day has
been fine throughout the Dominion, and
in nearly all parts decidedly warm. Min-
imum and maximum temperatures:—Cal-
culation, 45-72; Edmonton, 35-58; Prince Al-
bert, 52-72; Qu'Appelle, 68-88; Winnipeg,
55-80; Port Arthur, 52-72; Pelly, 50-70;
Edmonton, 50-70; Ottawa, 58-84;
Montreal, 62-78; Quebec, 56-76; Halifax,
50-78.

Probabilities:—Lakes: Moderate to fresh
southerly and south-west winds; the
very warm thunderstorms at a few
places.

Local Temperatures:—The highest and
lowest reading of the thermometer at the
Observatory on Wednesday, July 1, 1896,

THEY DID IT THIS TIME.

Street Railway Company Handle
Springbank Crowds

WITHOUT ANY TROUBLE.

Between Six and Seven Thousand
People Visit the Park—Ideal
Weather and no Accidents—
The Attractions.

It was ideal weather for a holiday.
In London it passed off almost as
quietly as the average Sunday, every
place of business excepting the hotels,
fruit and confectionery stores being
closed, and nothing of interest going
on outside of the baseball games.

A large percentage of the people left
their homes early in the morning, more
in the afternoon, and still more in the
evening, all bound for the one place—
Springbank. Those who started early

found their lunch baskets and other
requisites, and those who followed
later came without them. There were
children, of all sizes and ages, men
young and old, and women the same.
There were from 6,000 to 7,000 of them,
and to-day it is doubtful if one of
them would say he or she did not have
a splendid outing.

The sky was clear and the sun bright
during the morning and afternoon, the
latter shining so strongly that the pic-
nickers evidently thought he was try-
ing to do his best to satisfy the pub-
lic, and was almost overdoing it.

In the shades of the evening, the air be-
came pleasant, and consequently
everybody was all the more pleas-
ed. The Street Railway Company did well.

Their experience of May 25th had
taught the management many lessons,
to prevent a repetition of which steps
were at once taken. It was more
switching accommodation that was
needed, and more of it they got, but
they are going to have more still.

Then the running of the cars was
done in such a systematic way that
delays were impossible, and the return
trip could be made at any time dur-
ing the day in exactly one hour and
four minutes. An efficient service
was given from the start in the
morning, and thus the crowd was
easily handled and not allowed to get
ahead and cause a blockade to any
appreciable extent. Four motors, with
trailers, were run each way, and so
thoroughly the passing at switches
could be made with only a one-
minute stop by the city bound cars.

No wonder need be expressed that
Manager Carr, Superintendent De-
Harte and Assistant Superintendent
Robinson were big, wide smiles. Mr.
Carr and Mr. DeHarte were at the
Springbank end of the line the greater
part of the day looking after things
in general. Mr. Robinson was in
charge at the city end.

When Manager Carr was not by a
Free Press representative in the evening
he was just taking a short breath-
ing spell.

"Yes," he said, "we have had no
trouble whatever to-day; everything
has run so smoothly as clockwork."

"In strong contrast to the 25th of
May," replied Mr. Carr, "that time
we tried to do too much, and you
know the result. But to-day we have
demonstrated that we can handle as
large a crowd as will ever want to
come to the Park."

The Band of the London Musical
Society furnished concerts afternoon
and evening, that of the evening be-
ing unusually good. A display of fire-
works was also given from the north
side of the river, while a number of
lime-light views were shown on a
canvas placed on the face of the hill.

A series of tub and swimming races,
and exhibitions of diving were also
given in front of the cafe, and they
furnished unlimited amusement.

To the grounds, the grounds alone
have amply repaid a person for the
trip. The fence around the east pond
was ornamented with vari-colored in-
duscent lights, and in the nearby
apple trees similar lights were hung,
making a sight which was beautiful
to behold. The tower lamps were
trimmed and burning, and furnished
sufficient light for a radius of 200
yards.

The last car left the Park at a sea-
sonable hour.
