## SCHOOL MEETING.

At a meeting of the School Board held Tuesday evening the necessary amount for school purposes was set at \$19,000. This is a considerable increase over last year. A communication was read from the Mother Superior of Hotel Dieu requesting that the Convent School be taken over by the Campbellton School Board. The matter was referred to a committee which will interview the Mother Superior, view the buildings and report at the next meeting.

## G. W. V. A. WANT GRANTS.

The members of the Great War Veterans' Association, intend to ask the provincial government for a grant of one hundred acres for each returned soldier within the province willing to settle on land together with tax exemptions for three years and a loan to each returned soldier of \$500 to enable him to get a start on the land. William Richards, of Fredericton; O. J. Lawson of Campbellton, and H. Allingham, of St. John, have been appointed a committee to take this matter up with the premier and members of the government. This committee will probably interview the government at the meeting to be held here on Wednesday and Thursday of this week.

## CHATHAM TAX RATE.

The tax bills are now being made out. The assessment this year reaches the large total of \$67,000 and the rate has gone up \$3.00 to \$3.50. This is an increase of about 18 per cent in taxation.—Gazette.

## MUCH GRAIN DISTRIBUTED.

## CANADIAN FORESTRY CAMP AT KNOCKANDO.

A busy scene in a beautiful spot.

We are indebted to Miss Hill of Athol, for the following interesting account of the Canadian Forestry Camp at Knockando. It is copied from "The Northern Star," published at Elgin, Scotland.

The members of the Canadian Forestry Corps encamped near Knockando station, after several months' preparatory work erecting their sawmill, huts, railway, cable, footbridge across the Spey, &c. have been in full working order, and a visit to their encampment is both interesting and instructive. The camp is situated on the haugh below Dalbeattie farm, in the midst of beautiful surroundings, and a good view of the small wooded village is obtained from the train as it approaches Knockando station.

The officers are housed in a bungalow on the north side of the railway overlooking the camp, while the men's sleeping quarters are in the large malt barn at the adjoining distillery. The grain loft above the sleeping room serves as a recreation room, and here are the quarters of the Y. M. C. A. and a canteen, the former being in charge of Sgt. Burns. The men are supplied with books, papers, and games, while for music they have the use of a piano and a powerful gramophone. During the evening the men may have coffee and biscuits at a reasonable charge. About once a fortnight the men are treated to a cinematograph entertainment, an operator with his machine going round the various camps in the district. On occasional Sunday's religious services are conducted by the district chaplain, and local ministers.

The large sawmill is at the east side of the camp, and there is a siding to it from the main line for the easy and quick transport of the shippers, &c., which are turned out daily in reasonable numbers. The mill produces about 25,000 feet of cut wood daily, and the speed with which the wood is handled is an eye-opener. The large wood which is being cut down is on the Ballindalloch estate on the opposite side of the Spey, and a light railway about two miles long has been constructed for the rapid transit of the cut trees. Small bogies on the line convey the logs to the cable head.

This cable, which is two inches in diameter and about 700 yards long with its carriage, conveys the logs by gravitation across the river to the sawmill. The empty carriage is pulled back by an engine on the south side of the river. The carriage can accomplish six journeys within an hour, and over 400 logs are conveyed across daily to be sawn up. The logs are thrown on to the platform and then pulled up by machinery on to the sawing bench. The large circular saw is furnished with moveable teeth, and is much thicker than the Scotch saw, thus producing more sawdust, which is removed by a chain bucket arrangement and emptied into a cart for removal. The cut wood is conveyed along a moveable platform, trimmed by the "edger," marked, and loaded into wagons either for sending away or stacking along the side of the loop line. A powerful engine drives the machinery for the mill, and also supplies the motive power for the electric plant which lights up the various buildings in the camp.

## Culinary Arrangements, &amp;c.

Proceeding westward, we come to the blacksmith's shop where horseshoeing and general blacksmith work are carried on. A short distance off is a small hospital, containing four beds, which, owing to the splendid health of the men, are seldom or ever occupied. Passing the orderly room, in front of which is a large flagstaff displaying the flag of the land of the maple leaf, we come to the men's messhouse and cookhouse, and here the wants of the inner man are well looked after. The cooking is done in a large oven capable of doing a 70 lb. roast; and in large boiling pans. Each man is supplied with 5 lbs. of beef weekly, and with potatoes, beans, and mashed turnips he receives a simple dinner to keep him in form for his arduous outdoor work. The men get
