N. B. MEDICAL MEN TO CONVENE HERE NEXT WEEK

Forty-Fifth Annual Meeting of Medical Society to be Held Here Wednesday Next

DALHOUSIE FERRY SERVICE DISCUSSED

Some Communication From Ottawa In Regard To Proposed Service On Lower Restigouche River.

Dalhousie, N. B.—When the question of re-establishing the steam ferry service between Dalhousie and Quebec Points was taken up a few months ago between Hon. Charles Marcell, P. Q., and Mr. C. H. LaBilloy of Dalhousie, acting in his capacity of Vice President of the Co. of Restigouche, for the New Brunswick Tourist and Resources Association, it was hoped at the time that in view of the addition to be made to the Upper Maguasha wharf and a slip provided, that arrangements could be made for the convenience of automobilists, wishing to motor to the Gaspé District, for the taking over to the Quebec side opposite Dalhousie, of automobiles by the use of a scow. Serious objections to this having been made by the Department of Marine, it has been decided according to a letter just received from Hon. Mr. Marcell, to abandon the scow proposition between Dalhousie and Maguasha, consequently automobilists wishing to visit the Gaspé District will have to cross between Campbellton, N. B. and Cross Point, P. Q. Mr. Marcell's letter speaks for itself.
