Continuing, the announcement says a considerable number of the crews of these vessels were saved by H. M. S. Lowestoft and by a division of torpedo boat destroyers. destroyers. Trawlers and their boats also aided in the work of rescue. The Aboukir was torpedoed first, the Hogue and Cressy drew in close to her and were standing by to save her crew, when they also were torpedoed.
