It is no exaggeration to say that as Disraeli educated the conservative party up to his own standard of Toryism, so Hayward educated the best society in England up or down to his own standard of good propriety. He had other triumphs than these. No man before or since his day, with the same slight commendations of birth or social status, ever won so large a degree of the confidence of public men.
