Lieut. Gov. Dewdney has telegraphed the authorities at Ottawa that Gen. Strange advises the sending of all troops possible into the Saskatchewan district west of Battleford, where the Indians are collecting in great force.

Alarm at Qu'Appelle.

Fort Qu'Appelle, April 28.—Some settlement was created in camp at 2 o'clock this morning, as it was thought an attack had been made by Indians or halfbreeds. Several shots were fired at first, but as no one gave the alarm. Two companies of the Simcoe Foresters and York Rangers were put under arms and remained in readiness if their services were required. Fires were seen burning on the hills in the distance, supposed to have been started as signals by halfbreeds proceeding northward to join Riel at Dafoe. Scouts were sent out from the camp to reconnoitre in the neighborhood for traces of the rebels and it was found that several houses of settlers here had been plundered by halfbreeds.

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THIRTY HOURS IN SESSION.

PARLIAMENT PUTS IN ITS LONGEST SITTING ON RECORD.

On April 28.—The longest parliamentary sitting on record just came to an end. The house has been in session continuously since 3 o'clock yesterday, making a period of thirty hours, thus exceeding by three hours the famous sitting on the Letellier matter in 1878.

Since 2 o'clock this morning a gentleman has been kept up by the opposition, member after member rising to read works on the subject of female franchise. The library was ransacked for books and every one who has written on this point from John Stuart Mill down has been heard of during the past 24 hours.

Very few who spoke depended upon their own resources, the time being put in by reading chapter after chapter from these works. The conduct of members was generally good-natured, interruptions of a nature of being gladly welcomed by the opposition speakers as a relief to them in their steady stream of talk, and as making a break in the monotony.

Several motions to adjourn were made, but all were rejected by a majority on the government side. "Home Sweet Home," "God Save the Queen," "The British Lion," and "The British Lion" were taken command.
