Dr. A. R. Pyne has furnished his analysis of the three samples of city water procured Nov. 25. The result cannot be gratifying to e citizens, the doctor claiming that one-th of the water supply is procured from

the bay.

The samples were taken from the intake pipe, the pumping well and the slip east of the well. He says:

"On comparing the results of these three analyses, in my opinion, there is but one conclusion to be arrived at, viz.: That there is an enormous amount of water from the bay finding ingress into our water supply, highly contaminating it. I venture it as an opinion that the water as at present supplied to the citizens can contain but little less than 20 per cent. bay water. This opinion is based upon the quantities of impurities occurring in the three analyses above."
