TORONTO, Feb. 11.—Receipts at the Union stockyards today were 122 cars, with 2193 cattle, 160 calves, 1,299 hogs, 481 sheep and lambs, and 20 horses. There was a moderately good run of cattle at the Union stockyards today. Trade was not too brisk and a heavier run would probably have made it hard to maintain prices at last week's levels. As it was prices were not more than steady on the best grades and inclined to ease off on the commoner grades. Two or three loads of choice steers sold from \$6.75 up to \$7.40, the latter figure being top price for the day, and only about a couple of loads at that. Three good loads sold at \$6.00.
