HOME RULE FOR ALL.

SCOTLAND, WALES, AND ENGLAND, TOO,
MOVING FOR LOCAL GOVERNMENTS.

Whatever be the result of the motion, on March 29, in favor of Home Rule for all parts of the united Kingdom, it is a step in the right direction. The friends of Irish Home Rule must see in this resolution of the House of Commons an advantage gained for their cause. The great weakness of Home Rule hitherto

has been the fact that it was presented to the people as an exceptional and merely Irish measure. It is true that the case of Ireland is exceptional, since she, of all the parts of the Kingdom, is denied any semblance of self-government. She is governed by aliens, for the benefit of aliens, not by Irishmen for Irishmen. Irishmen would not object to be governed, for the benefit of the Empire, by the same laws that apply to Great Britain. But she has always been ruled by exceptional and unfriendly laws for the benefit of an English interest, and administered by aliens. Ireland, therefore, is the division of the Kingdom that stands most in need of Home Rule. Without it she cannot prosper, and ought not to be content. But it is clear to every Irishman that Irish Home Rule would be more readily attained if each of the divisions of the Kingdom was to demand Home Rule for itself. There would be nothing exceptional in giving Ireland what England, Scotland and Wales severally secure for themselves. Further, the stability of Irish Home Rule would be strengthened by a grant of Home Rule all round. For there would be no disposition to revoke Irish Home Rule if English Home Rule were an accomplished fact. So that the establishment of Home Rule in each of the divisions of the Kingdom would facilitate the realization of the Irish demand, and would also render Irish autonomy permanent.

The tendency of late legislation promoted by the Liberal party is in the direction of Home Rule. The English county councils and parish councils and school boards are all measures of decentralization, and therefore of local autonomy. The transition to a Federal United Kingdom from the present form of union would be easy and create very slight disturbance. The Imperial Government would be scarcely altered—only the Local Government Board and one or two minor departments would be subtracted. The cares of the Crown Ministers would be greatly lightened, and the time of Parliament would be wonderfully economized. The *amour propre* of the several divisions of the Kingdom would be better consulted by placing all on an equality like American States. And all the difficulties connected with the Irish members voting on some questions and abstaining from voting on British measures would be swept aside; for the natural consequence of a Federal Union would be to draw the line between local and imperial affairs, and only the latter would occupy the attention of Parliament. Barley, etc.—Prices are down to \$17 for car lots, and we quote \$17.00 to \$17.50. Some buyers say they will not pay over \$16.50. Shorts are quoted at \$18.50 to \$19.00, and Mouille \$21 to \$23 as to grade.
Wheat.—Red and white winter wheat are reported at 75c f.o.b. We quote No. 2 red winter in this market at 72c to 73c. No. 1 Manitoba hard 81c to 82c.
Corn.—The market remains firm, and Ontario is quoted 61c to 61c in car lots.
Peas.—Prices are more or less nominal at 70c in store, which, however, buyers say they cannot pay. Owing to lower freights in the West, sales have been made in the Stratford district at 68c per 60 lbs.
Oats.—Sales of No. 2 white have been made at 40c to 41c, but buyers say they will not pay over 39c now.
Barley.—Prices are more or less nominal at 55c to 56c for malting and 50c to 51c for feed.
Rye.—The market is firm at 55c to 56c.
Buckwheat.—Steady at 58c to 51c, sales being reported at the inside figure.
Malt.—Prices unchanged 70c to 71c.
Seeds.—Canadian timothy at \$8.25 to \$8.50. Red clover is at 11c to 12c per lb; alsike 10c to 11c, mammoth clover 11c to 12c.

Baled Hay.—No. 2 shipping hay \$7 to \$7.50 in round lots, and No. 1 straight Timothy at \$8 to \$8.50. At country points \$5.50 to \$6.50 f.o.b. as to location.
Hops.—Prices are nominal at 5c to 8c as to quality.
Honey.—Old extracted 5c to 5 1/2c per lb. New 7c to 8c per lb in tins as to quality. Comb honey 10c to 13c.
Maple Products.—The supply of both syrup and sugar is fully equal to the demand, with sales of the former in kegs at 5c to 5 1/2c, one lot of dark colored selling at 4 1/2c per lb.
