

Hudec R. Developing Countries in the GATT Legal System. London: Trade Policy Research Centre, 1988. Traces the evolution of the GATT's legal policy towards developing countries. Argues that GATT's legal policy has failed to serve the interests of the developing world and proposes policy alternatives.

Hufbauer G.C., and Schott J.J. Western Hemisphere Economic Integration. Washington, D.C.: Institute for International Economics, 1994. Examines the prospects for free trade in the Western hemisphere. They develop "readiness indicators" to assess the ability of countries to implement and sustain reciprocal free trade obligations.

International Economic Issues. Halifax, Nova Scotia: Institute of Research on Public Policy, June 1990. Contains articles of interest on the future of the world trading system, and economic developments in the Pacific and EU.

International Monetary Fund. International Trade Policies: the Uruguay Round and Beyond. The World Economic and Financial surveys, vol. 1 & 2, 1994. These two documents are useful for both specialists and non-specialists. They cover all aspects of trade policy including pre- and post- Uruguay Round developments, and provide an analysis of trade remedies, competition policy, and regional trade agreements.

Jackson J.H. The World Trading System: Law and Policy of International Economic Relations. Cambridge Mass: MIT Press, 1989. Provides a clear introduction to the intricacies of the world trading system, including the GATT, and evaluates its future. The major rules are described and rule implementation and dispute resolution are addressed. Tariff and non-tariff barriers, most favoured nation policies, safeguards, adjustment, unfair trade, the rules on dumping, and subsidies are discussed. The place of the developing countries in the world trading system is also analyzed.

Kahler M. Regional Futures and Trans-Atlantic Economic Relations. New York: Council on Foreign Relations, 1995. Examines the impact of the proliferation and strengthening of regional arrangements in Europe, North America and the Asia Pacific region on future economic relations between the US and the European Union.

Kahler M. International Institutions and the Political Economy of Integration. Washington: Brookings Institute, 1994. Presents a comprehensive survey of the impact of economic integration on the development of international institutions.

Lawrence R.Z. Regionalism, Multi-lateralism and Deeper Integration. Washington, D.C.: Brookings Institution, 1995. Are regional arrangements building blocks or stumbling blocks to a better and more integrated global economy? The author addresses and explains both sides of the debate. The emerging regional arrangements in Europe, America, and Asia Pacific are surveyed and risks and benefits of these arrangements are discussed. The conclusion is that regardless of the risks and benefits, regionalism will continue and best use should be made of it. The facilitator should be the WTO.
