*Bill C100, 14 December 1987, recognizes a relationship between
duration of incarceration and adverse effects. Compensation is as
follows:*

<i>89-545 days</i>	<i>10% Compensation</i>	<i>(3-18 months)</i>
<i>546-910 days</i>	<i>15%</i>	<i>(18-30 months)</i>
<i>More than 910 days</i>	<i>25%</i>	<i>(30 months and over)</i>

*Note that an increase in incarceration from 18 to 30 months provides
a 250% increase in compensation, whereas an increase from 30 to 50
months provides no increase at all.*
