REQUEST FOR EXPLANATION OF PROGRAM CONCERNING PROMOTION OF WOMEN

Mrs. Lucie Pépin (Outremont): Mr. Speaker, my question is directed to the Secretary of State.

Last week's Budget provided for cuts in departmental spending. Mr. Speaker, I wish the Minister would give us the assurance that the Women's Program in the Department of the Secretary of State will not be abolished, as some people fear will be the case.

Hon. Benoît Bouchard (Secretary of State of Canada): Mr. Speaker, at the present time we are analyzing the Budget cuts and when this has been done, we will be able to inform the House and Canadians how my Department's budgets have been able to respond to these cuts.

EXCHANGE VALUE OF DOLLAR-EFFECT ON FOOD PRICES

Ms. Margaret Mitchell (Vancouver East): Mr. Speaker, my question is directed to the Minister of Finance. Low and middle-income families are paying very dearly for the lack of confidence in the Government's economic policies. Is it fair that an average family will pay an extra \$100 for food as a result of the falling dollar and this will be put on top of the extra tax burden as well as slashes to services for these same families?

Hon. Michael Wilson (Minister of Finance): Mr. Speaker, I think it is a well know fact that, if the NDP policies had been followed by the Government, the falling dollar would have been dropping through the floor. That is why we have taken action in the Budget to steady the dollar.

I would say to the Hon. Member that low-income families are benefiting from the increase in the child tax credit, the acceleration of the payment of the child tax credit, the lowincome refundable sales tax credit, and the \$100 million that we are redirecting to help those Canadians who are on welfare find work and become more accustomed to the workforce. These are things that are real benefits—
